FRIENDSHIP HOUR

NEWSFLASH¹: You no longer need to feel guilty about **chatting²** to a friend during work time. A Swedish company is piloting “Friendship Hour”, **encouraging employees³** to **reach out⁴** to others to combat the modern **scourge of loneliness⁵**.

Is it a smart **mental-health⁶** initiative, or an open invitation to **distraction⁷**?

For generations, the message from employers has been clear: work is for working. Personal conversations were something to be **squeezed into⁸** lunch breaks, whispered **by the kettle⁹**, or saved for **after hours¹⁰**. The image of two employees chatting has been **shorthand for¹¹** lost productivity for too long, a **minor offence¹²** **policed¹³** by **watchful¹⁴** managers and time clocks alike.

That **assumption¹⁵** is now being challenged by a small but provocative experiment in Sweden. Under a new initiative **dubbed¹⁶** Friendship Hour, employees are formally encouraged to spend up to an hour a week connecting with friends. “Fine,” many employers might say, “Just don’t do it **during paid time¹⁷**.”

And **there’s the rub¹⁸** – this initiative encourages employees to chat inside or outside the company during regular work hours. The goal is not **networking¹⁹** or team-building in the corporate sense, but something more human: maintaining real **social bonds²⁰** in an era of rising loneliness.

The idea would have been **unthinkable²¹** on the factory **shopfloors²²** of the 19th and 20th centuries. Even in office environments, personal phone calls were monitored, and chatting to a friend or **relative²³** would be considered **inappropriate²⁴**, unless regarding an **urgent matter²⁵**, such as a sick child.

We have relaxed the workplace with

open-plan offices, casual dress codes and **break-out areas²⁶**, making workplaces feel more social. Yet, there is often an **unwritten rule²⁷** not to **overdo²⁸** it. Many managers accepted that a little chat helps build morale and improve communication, but too much equals a lack of **commitment²⁹**.

Then came **remote** and hybrid **work³⁰**. Slack, Teams and Zoom replaced **corridor³¹** conversations, while loneliness quietly **surged³²**. Studies across Europe and North America show more adults reporting weak **social ties³³**, even while being constantly “connected” online. For employers, this has created a new problem: isolated employees are more **prone to³⁴** **burnout³⁵**, **disengagement³⁶** and long-term **sickness absence³⁷**.

Friendship Hour is a **response³⁸** to that **shift³⁹**. Its **supporters⁴⁰** argue that social connection is not a distraction from work but a **prerequisite⁴¹** for **sustainable performance⁴²**. By **legitimising⁴³** personal contact, companies may reduce stress, improve mental health and even **boost⁴⁴** loyalty. An employee who feels **permitted to⁴⁵** check in with a friend, they argue, may return to their tasks more focused, not less.

Sceptics are **unconvinced⁴⁶**. Critics worry about **blurred boundaries⁴⁷** and **uneven⁴⁸**

application⁴⁹. Who decides what counts as “friendship”? What stops an hour from becoming two? And in high-pressure environments, will employees really feel free to use the time, or will it become a benefit **in name only**⁵⁰?

There is also the cultural question: what works in Sweden, with its strong trust-based work culture, may not translate easily elsewhere.

And what about the **long-held notion**⁵¹ of keeping work and private lives separate? Maybe it never was **tenable**⁵², but some employees may **feel uneasy**⁵³ about work colonising yet another aspect of their personal life.

Many employers are likely to **resist**⁵⁴ the concept. They may **reasonably**⁵⁵ argue

that the friendship hour represents an additional employer cost or loss of productivity. The EU average working week is 36 hours. One hour represents approximately 2.8 percent of that time – who will **bear**⁵⁶ that cost? Are such calculations reasonable or **outdated**⁵⁷?

Friendship Hour may prove to be a short-lived experiment or the start of a new **approach to**⁵⁸ the work environment and a **recognition**⁵⁹ that a quiet office is not necessarily a healthy one. A short chat with a friend might sometimes be part of the job, not a **guilty pleasure**⁶⁰. Shh! Here comes the boss!

BULGARIA JOINS THE EURO

ON 1 JANUARY 2026, Bulgaria officially became the twenty first country to join the euro **at the expense of**¹ its **previous**² **currency**³, the lev. Jonathan Moore **investigates**⁴ the history and potential future implications of the change.

Bulgaria entered the European Union on 1 January 2007. In doing so, the Sofia **government**⁵ **committed itself to**⁶ joining the single European currency. Despite this, Bulgaria still remains the poorest EU **member state**⁷. In 2024, its **GDP**⁸ **per capita**⁹ was 34 percent below the EU average, making it the lowest in the Union. Its road to the **Eurozone**¹⁰ has been **hindered by**¹¹ **thorny issues**¹² like corruption, **money laundering**¹³ and high inflation.

Before they even joined the EU, the Bulgarian **authorities**¹⁴ had long aspired to **adopting**¹⁵ the euro. Back in 1997, the lev was **pegged to**¹⁶ the German mark in an **attempt**¹⁷ to control inflation. In 1999, Germany **switched to**¹⁸ the euro and effectively pegged the lev to the single European currency.

Under the Maastricht Treaty of 1992, all EU member states must **satisfy**¹⁹ five criteria to join the Eurozone. Targets are set for budget deficit, **debt-to-GDP ratio**²⁰, inflation, **interest rates**²¹ and **exchange rate stability**²².

According to the Financial Times, in 2024 Bulgaria failed to satisfy one of these five criteria, effectively **scuppering**²³ its ambition to adopt the euro by 1 January 2025. Despite **attaining**²⁴ relatively low levels of debt and budget deficit and **permitting**²⁵

its leading banks to be **supervised**²⁶ by the ECB (European Central Bank) – the organisation **responsible**²⁷ for controlling EU **monetary policy**²⁸ – it was refused Eurozone **membership**²⁹ due to **excessive**³⁰ inflation. At the time, this was running at 5.1 percent – much higher than the 3.3 percent EU **threshold**³¹.

However, this **temporary**³² **failure**³³ **merely**³⁴ **delayed**³⁵ the **inevitable**³⁶. By 1 January 2025, Bulgaria had reduced its **inflation rate**³⁷, and so it received the green light to join the Eurozone by 1 January 2026.

Both the EU authorities in Brussels and the Sofia government have welcomed Bulgaria's **inclusion**³⁸ in the Eurozone, **describing**³⁹ it as a historic **milestone**⁴⁰ that will further stabilise the Bulgarian economy. European Commission President, Ursula von der Leyen **claimed**⁴¹ that the switch

would increase trade, investment and employment in Bulgaria. The President of the ECB, Christine Lagarde, also **expressed**⁴² her **approval**⁴³ of the move. She called the Eurozone a powerful symbol of what Europe could **achieve**⁴⁴ through working together to **combat**⁴⁵ the **ill effects**⁴⁶ of the world's **geopolitical uncertainty**⁴⁷.

The idea of joining the single European currency is an **exceptionally**⁴⁸ controversial issue in Bulgaria. The latest Eurobarometer **survey**⁴⁹ **indicates**⁵⁰ that 49 percent of Bulgarians **opposed**⁵¹ the move.

The controversy was **aggravated**⁵² by the Bulgarian parliament **refusing**⁵³ President Ruman Radev's proposal for a referendum on adopting the euro. This **sparked**⁵⁴ protests in the streets of Sofia, calling for the lev to be saved. **Furthermore**⁵⁵, the country's political instability may also **cast doubt on**⁵⁶ its **readiness**⁵⁷ for the euro: the country has seen seven **elections**⁵⁸ in the space of four years.

Many Bulgarians fear that the euro will **drive** prices **up**⁵⁹. Since Croatia joined the Eurozone in 2023, prices in that country have **risen sharply**⁶⁰. Any further price rises in Bulgaria could make it impossible for some Bulgarians

to **make ends meet**⁶¹. **Moreover**⁶², some banks have expressed **fears**⁶³ of potential **disruption**⁶⁴ to card payments and **ATM**⁶⁵ **withdrawals**⁶⁶.

On the plus side⁶⁷, Bulgaria may well boost business and **commerce**⁶⁸ by joining the euro. The question is whether prices will remain relatively stable or **spiral out of control**⁶⁹.

As a result of Bulgaria's **accession**⁷⁰ to the Eurozone, the number of people using the euro has now **surpassed**⁷¹ 350 mln. Only six of the EU's 27 member states still remain outside the Eurozone: Poland, Sweden, Denmark, the Czech Republic, Hungary and Romania.

THE CRUDE¹ AWAKENING

IN EARLY 2026, as the world watched fuel prices rise dramatically after **joint**² US/Israeli strikes on Iran, it's easy to forget that oil was once sold as medicine. But the modern world's **dependence on**³ Middle Eastern crude did not **emerge**⁴ naturally. Paul Martin traces the history of Middle East oil to outline over a century of exploration deals, **pipelines**⁵ and geopolitical power **struggles**⁶.

Liquid Empire

Before 1900, coal was the undisputed sovereign of British industry, powering everything from factories to **naval fleets**⁷. Yet coal was **bulky**⁸, dirty and labour-intensive, and industrial planners were beginning to **look for**⁹

a more **efficient**¹⁰ fuel. Attention **gradually**¹¹ turned to crude oil, a resource soon to be known as "liquid gold"¹².

One of the first men willing to **gamble on**¹³ it was **mining magnate**¹⁴ William Knox D'Arcy, who **secured**¹⁵ a 60-year concession from the Shah of Persia in 1901. After years of **failure**¹⁶, and even a "cease work" order¹⁷ from investors, explorer George Bernard Reynolds finally **struck**¹⁸ oil at Masjed Soleiman, modern day Iran, on May 26, 1908, where the crude **gushed**¹⁹ 50 feet above the **rig**²⁰.

This discovery **prompted**²¹ the formation of the Anglo-Persian Oil Company (APOC) in 1909. Recognising that **naval supremacy**²² required the speed and **efficiency**²³ of oil-fired **engines**²⁴, Winston Churchill, then, as First Lord of the Admiralty, responsible for **overseeing**²⁵ the Royal Navy, pushed through a historic intervention in July 1914, just weeks before the **outbreak**²⁶ of the

First World War. The British government **purchased**²⁷ a 51 percent controlling **stake**²⁸ in APOC for GBP 2.2 million.

Wonder what happened to APOC? The company became the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company in 1935 and British Petroleum in 1954 – today known simply as BP, a familiar name and a reminder that the oil that **burst from**²⁹ the Persian desert in 1908 still runs through the arteries of global energy politics.

Black Gold Rush

As the **interwar years**³⁰ progressed, the **search for**³¹ petroleum **shifted to**³² the Arabian Peninsula, scaling the industry to a **global disruption**³³. While the British held the north, American interests moved south. In 1933, King 'Abd al-'Aziz Al Sa'ud, the founder of Saudi Arabia, **granted a concession to**³⁴ Standard Oil of California. Five years of fruitless **drilling**³⁵ followed until March 3, 1938, when the Dammam No. 7 well, **dubbed**³⁶ "Prosperity Well," **hit oil at a depth of 1,440 meters**³⁷. This single well proved that Saudi Arabia sat upon roughly 25 percent of the world's known reserves, transforming what had been a **pastoral**³⁸ kingdom into a global energy titan.

To keep prices high and stable, a group of Western oil companies known as the "Seven Sisters," **including**³⁹ the **predecessors**⁴⁰ of BP, Shell and Exxon, coordinated

Key Moments in Middle East Oil

• 1908 – Persia's First Strike

The modern Middle Eastern oil industry began in 1908 when explorer George Bernard Reynolds struck oil at Masjed Soleiman in Persia (modern-day Iran). The discovery led to the creation of the Anglo-Persian Oil Company, the corporate ancestor of today's BP, and marked the beginning of Western **involvement in**¹ the region's petroleum resources.

• 1938 – Saudi Arabia's Prosperity Well

After years of unsuccessful drilling, Standard Oil of California finally struck oil at Dammam No.7 in eastern Saudi Arabia in March 1938. The well confirmed that the kingdom **sat atop**² vast reserves, transforming Saudi Arabia from a **sparsely populated**³ desert state into one of the world's most important energy producers.

• 1960 – The Birth of OPEC

In September 1960, Iran, Iraq, Saudi

Arabia, Kuwait and Venezuela met in Baghdad to establish the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC). The new alliance aimed to coordinate oil production and reclaim control over pricing from the Western oil companies that had dominated the industry for decades.

• 1973 – The Oil Embargo Shock

During the Yom Kippur War in October 1973, Arab oil producers **cut supplies to**⁴ countries seen as supporting Israel. The resulting embargo sent global oil prices soaring and exposed how deeply industrial economies **depended on**⁵ Middle Eastern energy.

• 2026 – A New Hormuz Crisis

By early 2026, rising tensions between Iran, the United States and Israel once again placed the Strait of Hormuz at the centre of global attention. With **roughly**⁶ a fifth of the world's oil passing through the narrow waterway each day, even the threat of disruption was enough to send crude prices sharply higher

much of the world's oil production. Through agreements such as the 1928 Red Line Agreement, they **divided**⁴¹ large parts of the Middle East into shared zones and **avoided**⁴² **competing with**⁴³ one another. For decades the system worked largely in their favour: producing countries received royalties, but pricing power remained in Western **boardrooms**⁴⁴. That arrangement began to **unravel**⁴⁵ after the Second World War. In Iran, Prime Minister Mohammad Mossadegh **attempted to**⁴⁶ nationalise the country's oil industry in 1951, **triggering**⁴⁷ a CIA – and MI6-backed **coup**⁴⁸ in 1953 that temporarily **restored**⁴⁹ Western influence. Yet the broader shift could not be stopped. In 1960, Iran, Iraq, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Venezuela created the **Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC)**⁵⁰ to coordinate production and **reclaim control over**⁵¹ pricing. By the early 1970s, many producing states were nationalising their oil industries, breaking the dominance of the Seven Sisters and shifting power from Western corporations to oil-exporting governments.

Choke Point⁵²

The new balance of power became painfully clear during the 1973 Oil Embargo. After the outbreak of the Yom Kippur War, Arab members of OPEC cut production and **halted**⁵³ shipments to countries seen as supporting Israel, including the United States and parts of Western Europe. The effect was immediate. Oil prices **surged**⁵⁴ from about USD 2.90 per barrel to USD 11.65 by January 1974, triggering a global energy crisis that **exposed**⁵⁵ how dependent modern economies had become on Middle Eastern crude.

The shock introduced the world to “**stagflation**⁵⁶,” where economic growth **stalled**⁵⁷ even as prices **soared**⁵⁸, and **highlighted**⁵⁹ the **vulnerability**⁶⁰ of the maritime corridors

that carry much of the world's oil. Nowhere is this clearer than the Strait of Hormuz. Only 21 miles wide at its narrowest point, the passage between Iran and Oman has become the world's most sensitive energy chokepoint. Around one fifth of global petroleum moves through it each day. When other routes have closed, as happened when the Suez Canal was shut between 1967 and 1975, tankers have **been forced to**⁶¹ **detour**⁶² around Africa, adding weeks to transit times.

Crude Awakening

By March 2026, as the United States and Israel **exchanged missile and drone strikes with**⁶³ Iran, the “Crude Awakening” reached **fever pitch**⁶⁴. **In the aftermath**⁶⁵, the Strait of Hormuz **faced**⁶⁶ a **de facto closure**⁶⁷ that remained in place at the time of writing. By March 11, Brent crude had surged to USD 119 per barrel, a sharp rise **sending shockwaves through**⁶⁸ global markets as a sudden “war premium” **took hold**⁶⁹ and maritime insurance across the Gulf was **suspended**⁷⁰. The 21st century has been defined by a **push toward**⁷¹ decarbonisation, yet the current crisis is a reminder that the global economy still beats in rhythm with Middle Eastern oil flows. While the long-term transition to **renewables**⁷² continues, the immediate reality remains one of competing energy blocs. But control has also shifted. Today's “New Seven Sisters” are no longer Western corporations, but state-owned giants such as Saudi Aramco and China's CNPC, companies that now dominate global production to reflect a profoundly redrawn geopolitical energy map.

Freedom

We may **take it for granted**¹, and consider it a fundamental **human right**², but who is free, **to what extent**³, and how is freedom **measured**⁴?

While it is a word we all have in our **vocabulary**⁵, it is sure to **trigger**⁶ different ideas depending on our **upbringing**⁷, **values**⁸ and social norms. Freedom is a **dichotomy**⁹ between collective and **individual freedom**¹⁰, **permission**¹¹ and **prohibition**¹², and each country decides where the balance lies. **Free speech**¹³ versus censorship is a **case in point**¹⁴. Taking these **conundrums**¹⁵ **into account**¹⁶, is it at all possible to 'measure' freedom? **It turns out it is**¹⁷.

In 2025, organisations such as the World Population Review and the Human Freedom Index offer some of the most

detailed **snapshots**¹⁸ of how freedom varies from country to country, and why it matters so much, not just for politics, but for **prosperity**¹⁹ and human **well-being**²⁰.

Freedom commonly covers two dimensions²¹:

Personal Freedom²² – this includes **civil liberties**²³ and rights that allow individuals to **express themselves**²⁴, join **associations**²⁵, **practice** or change **religion**²⁶, choose who they love, or move freely within and across borders without **arbitrary**²⁷ **constraints**²⁸.

Economic Freedom²⁹ – reflects what **latitude**³⁰ individuals have to **pursue**³¹ economic activity: owning property, starting a business, trading internationally, **hiring**³² and **firing**³³ employees, and functioning in markets with minimal **state interference**³⁴.

How Is Freedom Officially Measured?

Quantifying³⁵ something as broad as freedom requires structured numerical systems that **assign** scores **to**³⁶ countries based on objective data. One of the most **comprehensive**³⁷ of these is the Human Freedom Index (HFI), **co-published**³⁸ by the Cato Institute and the Fraser Institute.

The HFI doesn't **rely on**³⁹ a single measure, but 87 **indicators**⁴⁰ **spanning**⁴¹ personal and economic freedoms. These include:

- **Rule of law**⁴² and security
- **Freedom of movement**⁴³ and **assembly**⁴⁴
- **Freedom of expression**⁴⁵ and **information**⁴⁶
- **Freedom of religion**⁴⁷ and personal relationships
- Market openness, **property rights**⁴⁸, regulatory burden
- Access to **sound money**⁴⁹ and international trade freedoms.

Each country is scored from 0 to 10, where 10 represents the highest level of freedom. The personal and economic **sub-scores**⁵⁰ are averaged to produce the final Human Freedom Index score.

Another well-known measure is the Freedom in the World index by the non-profit organisation Freedom House, which focuses on **political rights**⁵¹ and civil liberties, categorising countries as free, **partly**⁵² free, or not free.

The Global Landscape⁵³

According to the Human Freedom Index:

- Global levels of human freedom remain below their pre-pandemic levels, with **significant declines**⁵⁴ in personal freedoms such as freedom of

expression and assembly.

- Only around 14 percent of the world's population lives in countries within the top **quartile**⁵⁵ for freedom, while nearly 40 percent live in the bottom quartile.
- Between 2019 and 2023, freedom declined for nearly 90 percent of the world's population – a trend that spans rich and poor nations **alike**⁵⁶.

Stateless People¹: Freedom Without Citizenship²

Stateless people – those not legally **recognised**³ as citizens of any country – face severe restrictions on basic freedoms. According to the UN agency, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), at least 4.4 million people worldwide are officially stateless, though the true number is likely higher due to **under-reporting**⁴. Without citizenship, people may be **unable**⁵ to work legally, travel, access **healthcare**⁶ or education, own **property**⁷ or even register births. Statelessness **persists**⁸ due to conflict, **displacement**⁹, discrimination in nationality laws and gaps in **civil registration**¹⁰ systems. Like slavery, statelessness is not measured directly in most freedom indices.

1. Switzerland – A **perennial**⁵⁷ leader, scoring highest for both personal liberties and **economic openness**⁵⁸.
2. Denmark – Strong institutions and **robust**⁵⁹ civil liberties keep it near the top.
3. New Zealand – Combines personal freedom with an open economy.
4. Ireland – High scores in **legal protections**⁶⁰ and association rights.
5. Luxembourg – Small but with a very open economic system and strong protections.
6. Estonia, Finland, Czechia, the Netherlands and Australia also rank in or near the top 10.

Countries in Western Europe, North America and Oceania **consistently**⁶¹ dominate the upper **echelons**⁶² of freedom rankings.

Least Free Nations

At the other end of the freedom scale are countries where **authoritarian governance**⁶³, conflict, or **systemic repression**⁶⁴ **constrict**⁶⁵ everyday life:

Syria was **at the bottom**⁶⁶, **close** **ly followed by**⁶⁷ Iran, Yemen, Sudan and Myanmar. These countries have been **plagued**⁶⁸ by **internal conflict**⁶⁹, weak rule of law, and severe **curbs**⁷⁰ on speech and **dissent**⁷¹. This has become particularly **ap** **parent**⁷² during recent **unrest**⁷³ in Iran.

Hard as it is to imagine⁷⁴, some people are even **worse off**⁷⁵ and not even free enough to **feature**⁷⁶ in regular freedom **surveys**⁷⁷ (See Fact Box – **Slavery**⁷⁸ and **Statelessness**⁷⁹). Afghanistan, for example, under the Taliban, is the only country in the world where girls **are banned from**⁸⁰ **schooling**⁸¹ beyond sixth **grade**⁸² (around age 12), and women **are barred from**⁸³ **sec** **ondary**⁸⁴, university and most employment. Yet, **due to**⁸⁵ the **oppressive regime**⁸⁶, no **reliable data**⁸⁷ is available, so the country does not feature in the **annual**⁸⁸ survey.

What Freedom Means for Prosperity and Well-Being

Freedom is not just about liberty, but also strongly **correlates with**⁸⁹ other indicators of **human development**⁹⁰. The Human Freedom Index finds that:

- People living in countries with the highest freedom scores **tend to**⁹¹ enjoy significantly higher **incomes per capita**⁹² than those in the least free quartile.

Slavery, Statelessness and the Limits of Freedom Rankings

Modern Slavery: Freedom Reduced to Zero

Slavery represents the most extreme **absence**¹ of freedom: the **inability**² to refuse work, leave a **relationship**³, or control one's own life. According to global **estimates**⁴ by the International Labour Organization, Walk Free Foundation, and the International Organization for Migration, around 50 million people **worldwide**⁵ were living in modern slavery in 2021. This includes **forced labour**⁶, **human trafficking**⁷, **debt bondage**⁸ and **forced marriage**⁹.

The number is up by **roughly**¹⁰ 10 million compared with the previous global estimate. Conflict, **poverty**¹¹, weak rule of law, irregular migration and economic shocks, including the **aftermath**¹² the COVID-19 pandemic, have all increased **vulnerability**¹³ to **exploitation**¹⁴. Modern slavery exists in every region of the world, including high-income economies, though **prevalence**¹⁵ is highest where **labour protections**¹⁶ and **legal enforcement**¹⁷ are weakest.

Major rankings such as the Human Freedom Index do not include a specific "slavery" **variable**¹⁸. Because slavery is **illegal**¹⁹ and **hidden**²⁰ everywhere, reliable country-by-country counts are difficult, leaving a **gap**²¹ between measured freedom and **lived reality**²².

- Freedom correlates with higher life expectancy⁹³, tolerance, charitable giving⁹⁴ and environmental health⁹⁵.
- It shapes economic opportunity⁹⁶, individual dignity⁹⁷, and the social structures⁹⁸ that enable people to build meaningful⁹⁹ lives.

Lies, Damn Lies and Statistics¹⁰⁰?

Despite¹⁰¹ the value of indices¹⁰², surveys by organisations such as Pew Research show differences between formal protections¹⁰³ and everyday experiences¹⁰⁴. In short¹⁰⁵, some countries may be free in principle¹⁰⁶ (and in surveys) but not in practice.

The United States ranks highly in global freedom indices because these measure legal and institutional freedoms, such as constitutional rights¹⁰⁷, free elections¹⁰⁸, independent courts¹⁰⁹ and economic openness. On paper, these protections are strong. However, high incarceration rates¹¹⁰, racial disparities¹¹¹, aggressive policing¹¹² and gun violence¹¹³ sharply¹¹⁴ limit freedom for many Americans in practice. The result is a paradox: a country that is formally free, yet where significant sections of the population live with severe¹¹⁵ constraints on their daily freedom.

Most freedom indices are produced by Western, often US-based, institutions with classical-liberal **assumptions**¹¹⁶. While methods are transparent, critics argue this can favour **market-oriented**¹¹⁷ democracies and **underweight**¹¹⁸ **social outcomes**¹¹⁹ – an important **caveat**¹²⁰ when reading the rankings.

Freedom – Still Elusive¹²¹ for Many

The **notion**¹²² of freedom remains a **foundational**¹²³ ideal for many societies, but recent surveys suggest that it is far from guaranteed. We may even **question**¹²⁴ the data's **impartiality**¹²⁵. What is certain, however, is that millions of people globally still don't enjoy freedom, however it is measured, while elsewhere, **frictions**¹²⁶ between states and their **citizens**¹²⁷ remain.

***Commonly**¹²⁸ **attributed to**¹²⁹ both Mark Twain and British **Prime Minister**¹³⁰ Benjamin Disraeli, the full phrase is – There are three kinds of lies: lies, damn lies and statistics. The **inference**¹³¹ being that statistics can be used manipulatively to **support**¹³² a weak **argument**¹³³.

At its **core**⁹, K-Beauty is not just about products but a philosophy **emphasising**¹⁰ **prevention**¹¹ over correction, **consistency**¹² over **quick fixes**¹³, and skin health over heavy camouflage. The now-famous multi-step **routine**¹⁴ **reflects**¹⁵ a **deep belief**¹⁶ that good skin is **cultivated**¹⁷ patiently, **layer by layer**¹⁸. This **mindset**¹⁹, combined with fast innovation and **distinctive**²⁰ **branding**²¹, has **propelled**²² Korean beauty brands from local **shelves**²³ to **bathroom cabinets**²⁴ around the world.

What Exactly Is K-Beauty?

K-Beauty refers to skincare and cosmetic products developed and marketed by South Korean companies, as well as the routines and ideals **associated with**²⁵ them. **Cleansers**²⁶, **toners**²⁷, **essences**²⁸,

serums, **ampoules**²⁹, **sheet masks**³⁰ and **sunscreens**³¹ form the **backbone**³² of most K-Beauty lines.

Nothing new there, you might argue, so what **sets** K-Beauty **apart**³³?

development cycles³⁵, responding quickly to³⁶ trends, new ingredients³⁷ and consumer feedback³⁸.

- Accessibility³⁹: High-quality formula-tions⁴⁰ are often sold at mid-range or budget prices⁴¹, making experimentation less risky for consumers and within the reach of cash-strapped⁴² teenagers⁴³.
- Aesthetics⁴⁴: playful⁴⁵ packaging, pastel colours and clear ingredient storytelling⁴⁶ have made K-Beauty especially appealing⁴⁷ to younger buyers.

But the market is by no means⁴⁸ limited to girls. In South Korea, skincare is not gendered⁴⁹ or age-restricted to the same degree⁵⁰ as in many Western markets. Men's skincare is normalised, and preventive⁵¹ routines start early. This broad domestic⁵² demand has created a highly competitive⁵³ home market⁵⁴, where brands have needed to innovate to stand out from the crowd⁵⁵ and grab their piece of the market share⁵⁶.

Exotic Ingredients

Part of K-Beauty's allure⁵⁷ lies in its ingredients. Hyaluronic acid⁵⁸, centella asiatica (often called cica), green tea and niacinamide⁵⁹ are staples⁶⁰ that Korean brands have helped to popularise globally.

Then, there are the more unusual⁶¹ elements that grab headlines⁶² and spark curiosity⁶³. Snail mucin⁶⁴ – often jokingly⁶⁵ referred to as “snail slime⁶⁶” – is perhaps the most famous. Derived⁶⁷ from snail secretion filtrate⁶⁸, it is prized for its hydrating⁶⁹, reparative⁷⁰ and anti-inflammatory⁷¹ properties⁷². Initially met with scepticism (See Overcoming⁷³ the ‘Yuck’ Factor⁷⁴), it has since become mainstream, with some studies⁷⁵ supporting its benefits for skin regeneration.

Other eye-catching⁷⁶ ingredients include bee venom⁷⁷, believed to stimulate collagen production; fermented rice and soybean⁷⁸ extracts⁷⁹, which enhance⁸⁰ absorption and efficacy⁸¹; and ginseng⁸², long valued in traditional Korean medicine for its revitalising⁸³ properties. Even donkey milk, volcanic ash⁸⁴ from Jeju Island,

and mugwort⁸⁵ have found their way into formulations.

However, it is not just about novelty⁸⁶. Korean brands are skilled at combining traditional herbal knowledge⁸⁷ with modern dermatological research, presenting ingredients in ways that feel both ancient⁸⁸ and cutting-edge⁸⁹.

Overcoming the 'Yuck' Factor – and Other Concerns¹

Perhaps not surprisingly, many consumers thought, “Snail slime? That’s gross²! Initial consumer pushback³ included:

- The “yuck factor” of animal-derived⁴ ingredients
- Unfamiliar textures⁵ and application methods
- Ethical and vegan concerns
- Perceptions⁶ that multi-step routines were excessive⁷, indulgent⁸ and too time-consuming.

How Korean brands overcame it:

- Reframing⁹ language: “snail slime” became snail secretion filtrate or mucin complex
- Leading with science: clinical testing, dermatologist endorsements¹⁰ and visible results
- Influencer validation¹¹: trusted reviewers demonstrating effectiveness in real time.

What resistance changed (but didn’t stop):

- Some consumers still reject animal-based ingredients
- “Skinimalism” (a skincare philosophy that prioritises fewer, multifunctional¹² products to achieve healthy skin through simplicity) has challenged lengthy routines
- Brands responded with vegan formulas and streamlined¹³ product lines.

A good example is the sheet mask – a thin, pre-cut fabric⁹⁰ or cellulose sheet soaked in a concentrated serum and placed directly onto the face. Face masks existed long before, in the form of creams or pastes that were applied⁹¹ and washed off⁹². Korean brands reinvented the concept by making masks single-use⁹³, mess-free⁹⁴, and designed for regular application rather than occasional treatments⁹⁵. As a result, sheet masks became affordable⁹⁶ daily skincare tools⁹⁷ and have since spread worldwide⁹⁸, with countless⁹⁹ variations inspired by the Korean model.

Marketing, Influencers and the Power of Pop Culture

K-Beauty’s rise is closely tied¹⁰⁰ to South Korea’s wider cultural influence. K-pop idols, film stars and TV actors frequently act as brand ambassadors¹⁰¹, linking skincare routines to highly aspirational¹⁰² lifestyles. Social media platforms such as Instagram, TikTok and YouTube have magnified¹⁰³ this effect, with tutorials¹⁰⁴, reviews¹⁰⁵ and dramatic “glass skin” transformations (ultra-smooth, poreless¹⁰⁶, intensely hydrated complexion¹⁰⁷ with a

One of the most prominent¹¹⁰ K-Beauty-focused TikTok creators is @luadoll (Lua), a Korean influencer known for skincare tips¹¹¹, makeup¹¹² looks¹¹³ and beauty trends – she has around 12.3 mln followers on TikTok and 272 mln total likes across all platforms.

Unlike traditional luxury beauty marketing, K-Beauty leans heavily¹¹⁴ on¹¹⁵ education. Brands explain routines, ingredients and application methods in detail¹¹⁶, encouraging consumers to¹¹⁷ understand their skin, rather than blindly¹¹⁸ follow trends. This approach¹¹⁹ has helped to build trust and loyalty, particularly among younger, research-oriented¹²⁰ buyers.

E-commerce¹²¹ has also played a crucial role¹²². Direct-to-consumer platforms, global shipping¹²³ and multilingual¹²⁴ websites have enabled even small Korean brands to reach international audiences¹²⁵ without relying on¹²⁶ traditional distributors. Early growth¹²⁷ was driven by specialist beauty sites such as YesStyle and StyleKorean, while global marketplaces¹²⁸ like Amazon extended K-Beauty's reach into mainstream retail¹²⁹. More recently¹³⁰, social-commerce¹³¹ platforms including TikTok Shop and low-cost¹³² marketplaces such as Temu have accelerated¹³³ exposure through viral videos, influencer recommendations and aggressive pricing¹³⁴.

China, meanwhile, has been both a major growth engine¹³⁵ and a demanding¹³⁶ test market. Korean brands are widely sold on platforms such as Tmall, JD.com and Xiaohongshu, where livestreaming and peer reviews¹³⁷ shape purchasing decisions¹³⁸. Despite rising competition from domestic Chinese beauty brands, K-Beauty retains¹³⁹ a strong reputation in China for innovation, ingredient science and skin-first formulations.

A Large Slice¹⁴⁰ of a Large Pie

South Korea may be a relatively small country, but its beauty industry **punches** far **above its weight**¹⁴¹. The domestic cosmetics market is valued at **roughly**¹⁴² USD 15 – 18 billion, making it one of the largest **per capita**¹⁴³ beauty markets in the world. Even more **striking**¹⁴⁴ is Korea's role as an exporter. The country **consistently**¹⁴⁵ ranks **among**¹⁴⁶ the world's top cosmetic exporters, alongside giants such as France and the United States.

Global sales of Korean beauty products are **estimated**¹⁴⁷ to **exceed**¹⁴⁸ USD 10 billion **annually**¹⁴⁹, with strong growth in North America, Europe, Southeast Asia and the Middle East (See Top Korean Cosmetic Companies). Looking ahead, analysts expect the global K-Beauty market to continue expanding at a healthy **pace**¹⁵⁰, driven by e-commerce, social media marketing and the global appetite for skincare **solutions**¹⁵¹ that promise luxurious skin at **affordable**¹⁵² prices.

Fad¹⁵³ or Fundamental Shift¹⁵⁴?

As with any trend-driven industry, the question **inevitably**¹⁵⁵ **arises**¹⁵⁶: is K-Beauty just a passing cosmetics fashion?

Some aspects of K-Beauty, such as the **rigid**¹⁵⁷ 10-step routine, are already being simplified as consumers **push back against**¹⁵⁸ the **time-consuming**¹⁵⁹ multi-layered approach.

At the same time, Western and Chinese brands have **absorbed**¹⁶⁰ many K-Beauty ideas, **blurring**¹⁶¹ the **distinction**¹⁶² between K-Beauty and regular skincare. K-Beauty **manufacturers**¹⁶³ and distributors have enjoyed a **honeymoon**¹⁶⁴ period as market pioneers **cashed in**¹⁶⁵ **accordingly**¹⁶⁶. As **generic products**¹⁶⁷ are developed and marketed by other global players, the market will become much more competitive.

Nonetheless¹⁶⁸, Korean companies are continuing to invest heavily in **R&D**¹⁶⁹, biotechnology and dermatological science to maintain their **innovative advantage**¹⁷⁰. Authentic K-Beauty brands have also established their **credibility**¹⁷¹ as “original and best.” From Paris to New York to Warsaw, the **legacy**¹⁷² of Korean skincare is already visible on shelves and in daily skincare routines.

Loyalty Rewards Programmes¹

Are All the Rage²

– Are You In?

In recent years³, shoppers looking to earn reward points which they can cash in for⁴ free merchandise⁵ have gone absolutely bonkers for⁶ loyalty programmes. But is there a catch⁷? BEM's Michael Gaylord went shopping to check out⁸ if the points really 'check out'.

If you are a loyalty card holder and you've already made plans for the Christmas holidays, you may have cashed out⁹ your loyalty points to help pay for accommodation¹⁰ or flights. Reward programmes can mean some pretty sweet deals¹¹ for those who know how to play the game¹². But for some of us, those cards aren't doing much more than cluttering¹³ our wallets¹⁴, and for others, they are proving¹⁵ to be frustratingly unrewarding¹⁶. What have been some of their failings¹⁷, and how can we make the best use¹⁸ of loyalty reward programmes?

information on a form; they immediately receive credit-card sized piece of plastic, which they pass to the **retailer**²² each time they make a **purchase**²³; with each transaction they collect points **commensurate**²⁴ with the **expense**²⁵ of the purchase. When the purchaser reaches a certain points **benchmark**²⁶ (say 10,000 points), they can **redeem** the points **for**²⁷ free products, **groceries**²⁸, or even a **trip**²⁹. Most **grocery**³⁰ **chains**³¹, major **pharmacies**³², airlines, and even some fast food chains, offer the cards. Many banks offer credit cards which **tie in with**³³ **air miles collection**³⁴ that can be redeemed for flights (or other **goods**³⁵, in some cases).

Bonuses

Other than earning points which can be redeemed for air travel, are there **advantages**³⁶ to collecting points? Well, personal finance expert Barry Choi recently shared with CBC news that the practice can, potentially, be used to **offset**³⁷ inflation. He told CBC news “American Express rewards, for example, gives you a ten-dollar credit – **straight up**³⁸ – for every 1,000 points you **earn**³⁹, **regardless of**⁴⁰ what you spend your money on. So, if you earn and

spend quickly, know the value of your **redemptions**⁴¹, and choose programmes that are **co-branded**⁴² you can really save a lot.” (Co-branded means that many different stores belong to the same kind of loyalty programme and you can use that same card in several places.) Some programmes offer bonus redemptions points, in which the value of the points earned **doubles**⁴³ or even triples for a special time period.

Concerns⁴⁴

So, there are **obvious**⁴⁵ advantages, but some may **wonder**⁴⁶ what the potential **pitfalls**⁴⁷ are. Well, as shoppers are **revealing**⁴⁸ a lot of their **personal information**⁴⁹ when they fill out the application for the loyalty card, retailers have a lot of **data**⁵⁰ which can be shared and, potentially, stolen. **What's more**⁵¹, since retailers now have access to your **shopping habits**⁵² they can more **diligently**⁵³ **target**⁵⁴ you in their **marketing campaigns**⁵⁵. If you find this kind of thing irritating, it could be a bit of a **downer**⁵⁶. Also, earning benefits that are worth one's time and money does **require**⁵⁷ **a fair bit**⁵⁸ of shopping **savviness**⁵⁹. **For instance**⁶⁰, some programmes are limited in that they offer a pretty low redemption

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value and one can only collect the points for one retailer – for instance, imagine spending hundreds on cosmetics and **toilettry**⁶¹ products at a pharmacy only so that you can get, say, enough points for a free tube of toothpaste. Getting a **long-haul**⁶² “free flight” requires spending, **literally**⁶³, tens of thousands. The potential for **wasting money**⁶⁴ appears to be quite high, especially if one is **inclined to**⁶⁵ pay for many purchases with their credit card purchases and have difficulty paying the entire bill each month. **Beware**⁶⁶: **interest charges**⁶⁷ will accumulate.

How to Play the Game

Thus, effective use of the card – or cards – requires using those that offer maximum **flexibility**⁶⁸ and give you good value. **In other words**⁶⁹, choose one that **allows**⁷⁰ using the card across a **bonded**⁷¹ eco-system – where you can use the same programme in **multiple**⁷² locations and share it with other retailers. Some programmes allow you to use them for financial rewards, even allowing you to redeem your points as a **contribution to**⁷³ your **tax-free savings account**⁷⁴ or to your **RRSP**⁷⁵. This, **in the long term**⁷⁶, can be very valuable, as points collect **compound**⁷⁷ interest over time.

If a person is **altruistically minded**⁷⁸, there are **means**⁷⁹ to use the loyalty programmes to be **generous**⁸⁰. Some loyalty programmes allow you to **donate**⁸¹ your points, although it is usually limited to the **charities**⁸² that are **associated with**⁸³ the **particular**⁸⁴ programme. One could buy a tonne of gift cards from the retailer and then simply donate them to friends, family, or others in need. One regular air miles user told BEM, “With my air miles points, I earned enough to pay for my parents to have a vacation in Bali, and that **blew them away**⁸⁵!”

Getting Ahead

Collecting reward points via loyalty programmes certainly is a game that does have some **red flags**⁸⁶. Some people

can easily be **tempted**⁸⁷ to **overspend**⁸⁸; for people that simply don't spend a lot of money or don't like to shop, the collection of points for a truly valuable redemption can seem **agonisingly**⁸⁹ slow. However, used effectively, they can help save money and **obtain**⁹⁰, err, rewarding rewards. According to the experts, shoppers should take a methodical, personalised **approach to**⁹¹ choosing loyalty programmes. **Early on**⁹², **stick to**⁹³ one or two programmes. After you become **accustomed to**⁹⁴ them, **do some research**⁹⁵ on a few other programmes that offer attractive rewards for you. Choose programmes that are easily redeemable, **paired with**⁹⁶ credit cards, and allow points to be transferred to retail partners. And, don't forget to **keep track of**⁹⁷ your points and then cash them in as soon as you have enough points to collect your **aim**⁹⁸; you may not find yourself flying first class on Emirates, but at least you'll be improving your financial **well-being**⁹⁹ or **making**¹⁰⁰ a friend or **family member's**¹⁰⁰ **day**¹⁰¹.

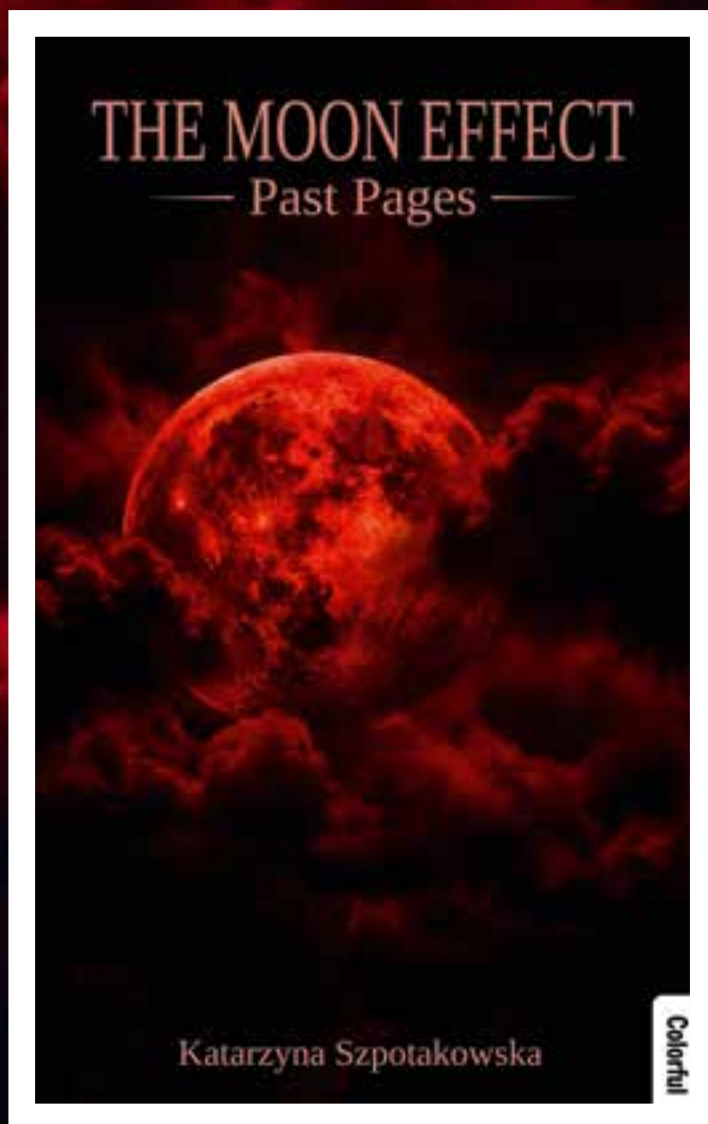

Jakarta Becomes the World's Biggest City

For several years, Tokyo has been **regarded as**¹ the world's largest city. However, the latest records **reveal**² that it has been **overtaken**³ by Jakarta in Indonesia. **Jonathan Moore investigates**⁴.

Tokyo Falls to Third Place

Not only has Tokyo been **leapfrogged**⁹ by Jakarta; Dhaka, the **capital**¹⁰ of Bangladesh, has also overtaken the Japanese capital. The *World Urbanisation*

The Official UN Statistics

According to a report recently published by UN DESA (the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs), entitled the *World Urbanisation Prospects 2025: Summary of Results*, the population of the Greater Jakarta Region has reached a **staggering**⁵ 41.9 mln **inhabitants**⁶. By way of comparison, the

estimated⁷ population of Canada is just over 40 mln, so more than the entire population of the world's second largest country by area is **residing**⁸ in one single metropolitan area.

Prospects 2025: Summary of Results report **indicates**¹¹ that Dhaka's population has reached **approximately**¹² 36.6 mln residents, while the population of Tokyo stands at approx. 33,4 mln.

Jakarta's Economic Pulling Power¹³

Indonesia is the largest economy in South East Asia, with Jakarta **accounting for**¹⁴ almost 17 percent of the country's GDP¹⁵. The city is **found**¹⁶ on Java, an island of 150 million inhabitants. With a **thriving**¹⁷ financial sector, two major **manufacturing**¹⁸ **hubs**¹⁹ (in the form of automotive and

electronics factories) in Bekasi and the city of Karawang (32 km east of Jakarta) and tech startups in and around the Indonesia's biggest city, **not to mention**²⁰ **logistics networks**²¹ **covering**²² the whole of Java and a consumer market in boom, hundreds of thousands of jobs are created in the area year after year. Moreover, Java is the central region of Indonesia, so Jakarta **brings in**²³ workers from Sumatra in western Indonesia as well as the islands of eastern Indonesia.

A Superior²⁴ Fertility Rate²⁵

Another reason why Jakarta and Dhaka have **shot into**²⁶ first and second spot ahead of Tokyo is the fact that their population is **expanding**²⁷ and not **contracting**²⁸. According to the Asia Lifestyle Magazine, Indonesia has a **median age**²⁹ of 30, while its fertility rate is practically at **replacement level**³⁰ 1.96 children per woman as at 2024 (according to the World Population Review). The availability of so many **working-age**³¹ individuals is the **driving force**³² behind the urbanisation of Indonesia's and, particularly, Jakarta. Indeed, with a population **exceeding**³³ 285.7 mln inhabitants (according to Worldometers.com), Indonesia is the fourth most populated country on Earth, **surpassed**³⁴ only by China, India and the United States. Similar trends like urbanisation, economic opportunities and a **fast-growing**³⁵ IT sector are also powering the rise of Dhaka as a global megacity. Moreover, in 2024, the Bangladesh's fertility rate was even superior to that of Indonesia. The World Population Review indicates that its fertility rate stood at 2.07 children per woman as at 2024.

Tokyo Goes the Other Way

By contrast, more and more **citizens**³⁶ of Tokyo are **moving away**³⁷ from the capital and its agglomeration into smaller cities, while Japan's fertility rate (approx. 1.4 children per woman as at 2024) means that there are **significantly**³⁸ more deaths than births in the country **per annum**³⁹.

Growth⁴⁰ Spiralling Out of Control⁴¹

The main **downside**⁴² of Jakarta and Dhaka's population growth is that both cities are **sprawling**⁴³ so fast that the **authorities**⁴⁴ cannot build **sufficient**⁴⁵ roads or railways, nor indeed the necessary **utilities**⁴⁶, in time to **cater for**⁴⁷ this **upsurge**⁴⁸. Moreover⁴⁹, **air pollution**⁵⁰ is a real problem. To some extent⁵¹, the **development**⁵² and

expansion of the Jakarta LRT (Light Rail Transit) and MRT (Mass Rapid Transit) Systems as well as the Greater Jakarta LRT network have helped. Still, many Jakartans spend over an hour **commuting**⁵³ to work.

Devastating Flooding⁵⁴ and Districts⁵⁵ Sinking⁵⁶

To add to its woes⁵⁷, the Greater Jakarta area is frequently the scene of serious floods due to **heavy rainfall**⁵⁸. As if that were not **painful**⁵⁹ enough, the area is **struggling with**⁶⁰ an even more serious **environmental challenge**⁶¹: as a result of **groundwater extraction**⁶², the city's northern districts are sinking as much as ten centimetres a year. This is pushing wealthier residents to its more **elevated**⁶³ southern districts such as South Jakarta, Bogor and Depok.

Housing⁶⁴: Demand⁶⁵ Outstrips⁶⁶ Supply⁶⁷

Consequently, when it comes to housing, demand is outstripping supply. There are waiting lists⁶⁸ for middle-income apartments⁶⁹ in South Jakarta, and land prices in accessible transport corridors⁷⁰ have trebled⁷¹ over the past decade. Since 2022, the monthly rent for a two-bedroom flat⁷² in a reasonably⁷³ attractive district of Jakarta has risen 22 percent, reaching the equivalent of USD 950 to USD 1,600.

A New Capital: Nusantara

In 2019, the government⁷⁴ of Indonesia unveiled⁷⁵ plans to relocate the country's capital to the new city of Nusantara in northeastern Indonesia, with a view to alleviating⁷⁶ Jakarta's demographic and ecological challenges. The new capital was originally earmarked⁷⁷ for inauguration in 2024. However, the target date has now been postponed⁷⁸ to 2028.

Asia Dominates the World Top Ten

According to the UN and Al Jazeera, nine out of the world's ten most populated urban areas are in Asia. Fourth-placed Cairo in Egypt, with a population of approx. 32 mln. In fifth place comes New Delhi, the capital of India with approx. 30.2 mln inhabitants, followed by the Chinese cities of Shanghai and Guangzhou (on 29.6 and 27.6 mln respectively⁷⁹); Manila in the Philippines (24.7 mln); Kolkata in India (22.5 mln); and Seoul in South Korea (22.5 mln).

A Dubious Honour⁸⁰

In some respects⁸¹, being the world's most populous city may be a dubious honour. If this statistic is a success, then Jakarta may become a victim⁸² of its own success. While a healthy⁸³ fertility rate is generally viewed as a positive development,

Jakarta's spiralling population – with the resulting high levels of air pollution and poor⁸⁴ sanitation⁸⁵ – as well as environmental challenges like flooding and sinking are placing enormous⁸⁶ pressure on its

infrastructure. This may explain why the Indonesians are building a new capital. Time will tell⁸⁷ whether this helps alleviate Jakarta's population problem.

The Audio AI¹ Revolution

If you want to know **the next big thing**² in AI, then listen up.

While image and text-based AI have dominated the **headlines**³ and our imaginations, a quieter but equally transformative revolution is happening in sound. Audio AI has **potential applications**⁴ **spanning**⁵ multiple **industries**⁶ and everyday life. It is **fast developing**⁷, and it won't be long before you are hearing all about it.

The results are **astonishing**¹⁷: realistic human-like speech, music compositions in various styles, lifelike sound effects, and precise **editing**¹⁸ of recorded audio. Unlike previous audio **software**¹⁹, which **relied heavily**²⁰ **on**²¹ **human input**²² and rule-based programming (if-then), Audio AI learns from massive **datasets**²³ and continuously improves itself.

What Is Audio AI?

Audio AI **builds on**⁸ **advances**⁹ in **machine learning**¹⁰, particularly **deep-learning**¹¹ **neural networks**¹². These systems **mimic**¹³ the way the human brain

are **startlingly**²⁴ natural. Companies like OpenAI, Microsoft, Google and Meta are investing heavily here, offering voices that **convey**²⁵ tone, emotion and personality. OpenAI is developing models **capable of**²⁶ realistic conversations and subtle **inflexions**²⁷. Google DeepMind and Meta are **pushing the boundaries**²⁸ of voice synthesis with minimal training data. Applications include **customer service**²⁹, virtual assistants, audiobooks and **accessibility**³⁰ for the **visually impaired**³¹.

- **Speech Recognition**³² and Enhancement AI now allows **devices**³³ to understand spoken commands more accurately, even in noisy **environments**³⁴. **Real-time**³⁵ transcription and translation are becoming standard **features**³⁶. **Tech giants**³⁷ are integrating these capabilities into smartphones, smart speakers and conference software, making audio interaction **smoother**³⁸ and more intuitive. Imagine **attending**³⁹ a multi-language video call where AI not only translates speech **instantly**⁴⁰ but also correctly interprets and **relays**⁴¹ tone and nuance.

- **Music, Entertainment**⁴² and **Sound Design**⁴³

Audio AI is transforming creativity and production. AI can compose music in any **genre**⁴⁴, remix **tracks**⁴⁵ and assist musicians by generating melodies, harmonies, or **drum patterns**⁴⁶ quickly. Adobe's

AI-powered **tools**⁴⁷ **enable** podcasters and video editors **to**⁴⁸ remove noise, **adjust**⁴⁹ **volume**⁵⁰ and **alter**⁵¹ voice characteristics. The film and gaming industries are using AI to generate dynamic **sound effects**⁵² and **ambient sounds**⁵³ **on demand**⁵⁴. There are companies whose entire business is creating AI music for commercial distribution. For example:

- Endel – creates personalised AI-generated ambient and relaxation tracks.
- IVA – composes classical and **cinematic**⁵⁵ music.
- Boomy – allows anyone to create AI songs and distribute them on Spotify.

These companies either sell licences to individuals and **brands**⁵⁶, or let users release their work directly to **streaming platforms**⁵⁷. It looks like they stand to **cash in**⁵⁸ with the generative AI music sector (which includes automated composition, **orchestration**⁵⁹ and AI-assisted music creation) **forecast**⁶⁰ to grow from **roughly**⁶¹ USD 558 mln in 2024 to about USD 2.8 billion by 2030.

- **Accessibility and Communication** Personalised synthetic voices for **speech impairments**⁶²: AI can create realistic voices for people who cannot speak. ElevenLabs allows users to generate a voice from a few **samples**⁶³, helping people with **ALS**⁶⁴ or **stroke**⁶⁵ communicate naturally.

emphasise⁶⁹ key sounds. For example, apps⁷⁰ like SonoCraftAR help deaf⁷¹ users follow conversations and environmental sounds.

Tailored⁷² spoken lessons in education: Platforms such as Noiz AI generate adaptive spoken lessons and pronunciation⁷³ coaching, making learning accessible for students with disabilities⁷⁴ or age-related cognitive challenges⁷⁵.

Voice-guided daily aids⁷⁶ for the elderly⁷⁷: AI systems like SpeechGen.io provide spoken reminders⁷⁸, instructions and storytelling⁷⁹ to support⁸⁰ memory, routines⁸¹ and engagement⁸².

Augmentative and alternative communication⁸³ (AAC): Apps like Spoken (Tap to Talk AAC) help users with communication impairments express themselves⁸⁴ quickly using AI-powered text prediction⁸⁵ and speech output⁸⁶.

Why Invest?

OpenAI, Microsoft, Google and Meta are investing heavily in Audio AI because they see voice as a transformative interface⁸⁷ for computing. OpenAI has stated it believes the next wave of AI interaction will be “audible⁸⁸,” with natural voice gradually replacing⁸⁹ keyboards⁹⁰ and screens in many applications. Meta’s CEO Mark Zuckerberg has highlighted AI, including voice, as central to a “generational paradigm shift⁹¹” that could create entirely new opportunities for products and services⁹².

Market data⁹³ backs⁹⁴ these bullish⁹⁵ predictions. One widely cited forecast

estimates⁹⁶ the AI voice generator market alone will grow from about USD 4.16 bln in 2025 to roughly USD 20.7 bln by 2031, with a strong compound annual growth rate⁹⁷ (CAGR) of around 30.7 percent.

Drawbacks⁹⁸

In practical terms⁹⁹, Audio AI could transform daily life:

- Virtual assistants may sound indistinguishable¹⁰⁰ from humans.
- Audiobooks and courses could be fully personalised.
- Video conferences may feature instant translation and natural tone.
- AI-generated content¹⁰¹ will blend¹⁰² seamlessly¹⁰³ with human creations.

But that may not be to everyone's taste¹⁰⁴ or benefit.

Audio AI raises serious ethical, legal and societal¹⁰⁵ questions that are only just coming into focus¹⁰⁶. Copyright¹⁰⁷ is particularly contentious¹⁰⁸. AI systems can generate music in the style of existing¹⁰⁹ artists, or closely mimic specific compositions, blurring the line¹¹⁰ between inspiration and infringement¹¹¹. If a machine produces a track that sounds unmistakably¹¹² like a well-known artist, ownership¹¹³ becomes unclear¹¹⁴. Musicians risk losing royalties¹¹⁵, as their creative work is replicated without consent¹¹⁶, deepening the financial strain¹¹⁷ on an industry already weakened by streaming.

There are also artistic concerns¹¹⁸. AI-generated music may lack the emotional depth of human creativity, while an oversupply¹¹⁹ of cheap, algorithmic tracks could lead to homogenisation. Popular formulas may be endlessly¹²⁰ recycled, reducing diversity¹²¹ and innovation – especially if streaming platforms' recommendation systems amplify¹²² more of the same.

Voice cloning presents an even more immediate risk¹²³. AI can now replicate voices with startling¹²⁴ accuracy¹²⁵, allowing them to be used in adverts¹²⁶, endorsements¹²⁷

Regulation¹⁴⁹ has failed to keep pace with¹⁵⁰ these advances¹⁵¹. Copyright law often offers little clarity¹⁵² on ownership of AI-generated content, and few countries have robust rules¹⁵³ governing¹⁵⁴ voice cloning or impersonation¹⁵⁵. Enforcement¹⁵⁶ is further complicated by the global nature of AI development, leaving victims¹⁵⁷ of misuse¹⁵⁸ with limited legal redress¹⁵⁹.

Perhaps most troubling¹⁶⁰ is the erosion of trust in sound itself. As realistic audio fabrication becomes commonplace¹⁶¹, people may begin to doubt¹⁶² the authenticity of what they hear – as is already the case with images. When voices can be cloned and music instantly reproduced, the boundary¹⁶³ between reality and fabrication blurs. Will we start to believe that nothing is real?

reputational damage, public deception and manipulation. A fabricated statement¹²⁹ in a politician's voice, or an actor appearing to endorse something they oppose¹³⁰, is no longer science fiction¹³¹.

Security risks¹³² compound the problem. As voice authentication¹³³ becomes common¹³⁴ in banking and smart devices, AI-generated voices can be used to bypass¹³⁵ safeguards¹³⁶, enabling fraud¹³⁷ and identity theft¹³⁸. More broadly, audio deepfakes can fuel misinformation¹³⁹, harassment¹⁴⁰ and emotional exploitation. Because audio is often trusted, and less carefully examined than images or video, it may prove to be one of the most dangerous tools for deception¹⁴¹ in the AI era.

The economic impact of Audio AI is another concern. As synthetic voices and music become more convincing¹⁴², industries built on human performance¹⁴³ – music, acting, audiobooks and voiceover¹⁴⁴ work – face potential job losses. While some professionals may benefit from AI as a tool, many risk being undercut¹⁴⁵ as low-cost automation replaces roles that are formulaic¹⁴⁶ or easily replicated. This raises difficult questions about labour, fair compensation¹⁴⁷ and how society values human endeavour¹⁴⁸.

Coda¹⁶⁴

Like most forms of technological advancement¹⁶⁵, Audio AI is a double-edged sword¹⁶⁶, offering myriad¹⁶⁷ possibilities but commensurate¹⁶⁸ risks. The challenge will be, in the words of the 1940s swing classic, covered¹⁶⁹ by Bing Crosby, Nat King Cole, Ella Fitzgerald and Frank Sinatra, to “accentuate¹⁷⁰ the positive, eliminate the negative.” Just make sure you are listening to an original, and not an authentic-sounding AI-generated copy.

Thailand's Economic Upgrade¹

Thailand built its success on tourism, exports and **global supply chains**². In 2026 the challenge is different. **Paul Martin** explores how the country is upgrading its economy through new industries, digital infrastructure, and advanced **manufacturing**³ while maintaining the cultural **appeal**⁴ that continues to attract millions of visitors each year.

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Bangkok's Working Skyline

The Airport Rail Link leaves Suvarnabhumi Airport every fifteen minutes. In around half an hour it reaches Phaya Thai station, where passengers can transfer directly to Bangkok's **elevated**⁶ BTS Skytrain network.

For many travellers, this short rail journey offers the first view of modern Thailand. From the train windows, traditional temple roofs appear beside mirrored office towers and tall **condominium developments**⁶. **Construction cranes**⁷ rise above new rail extensions that will **eventually**⁸ **expand**⁹ Bangkok's urban rail network to more than 550 kilometres of track by the early 2030s. The skyline **reveals**¹⁰ a country that is still building. Infrastructure development continues across the capital as Thailand adapts to growing urban populations and **increasing**¹¹ international mobility.

Suvarnabhumi Airport itself **reflects**¹² the scale of Thailand's travel economy. Before the pandemic it **handled**¹³ more than sixty mln passengers **annually**¹⁴. The opening of the SAT-1 satellite terminal in 2023 added **capacity**¹⁵ for another fifteen mln travellers each year, **reinforcing**¹⁶ Bangkok's position as one of Southeast

Asia's largest aviation hubs.

Thailand is a fully digital nation now too, with nationwide **4G coverage**¹⁷ and roughly ninety-five percent 5G availability. Visitors arriving in the capital can immediately access **ride-share services**¹⁸ like Bolt, digital payments, and mobile banking systems that support everyday travel across the country.

A City of Districts

Bangkok's urban landscape combines historic neighbourhoods with rapidly developing business districts.

Along Sukhumvit Road, cafés often double as informal workplaces where designers, programmers, and consultants **work remotely**¹⁹. Nearby, True Digital Park **hosts**²⁰ more than three hundred technology companies and start-ups inside a large mixed-use complex combining offices, apartments, **retail space**²¹, and conference facilities.

At the same time, historic districts remain central to the city's cultural identity. The Grand Palace and Wat Phra Kaew remain among the most visited sites in Southeast Asia. Nearby Wat Pho is famous for its **reclining**²² Buddha and for its traditional Thai massage school. Across the

Chao Phraya River, Wat Arun's **distinctive**²³ towers continue to dominate one of the capital's most recognisable riverfront skylines.

Markets also play an important role in Bangkok's urban economy. Chatuchak Weekend Market, one of the largest markets in Asia, contains more than eight thousand stalls selling clothing, antiques, **crafts**²⁴, and street food. Night markets such as Talad Rot Fai combine **food vendors**²⁵, live music, and vintage goods, **attracting**²⁶ residents and visitors.

Why More Poles Are Choosing Thailand

Thailand has become one of the fastest-growing **long-haul**¹ destinations for Polish travellers in recent years.

Tourism-board data shows a sharp **increase**² in visitors from Poland, with 180,722 arrivals recorded in 2024 and over 213,000 between January and mid-December 2025, a rise of nearly 30 percent year on year.

Affordability³ remains a major **draw**⁴, though costs **vary**⁵ by region. Street-food meals typically range from THB 50–100 (PLN 5.75–11.50), while dishes at casual **sit-down restaurants**⁶ cost roughly THB 180–450 (PLN 21–52). Budget travelers can manage daily **expenses**⁷ on about THB 1,400–1,800 (PLN 160–205), which covers basic **accommodation**⁸ and food but **excludes**⁹ flights and **high-end**¹⁰ excursions. Part of the appeal lies in relatively simple **entry rules**¹¹. Polish passport holders can travel to Thailand visa-free for tourism for up to 60 days, **extendable**¹² for 30 more on application, making longer winter stays relatively easy to organise.

Connectivity¹³ is also **improving**¹⁴. LOT Polish Airlines has announced a year-round Warsaw–Bangkok route starting in October 2026, operating five times per week, while charter flights and **package tours**¹⁵ have already helped familiarise Polish travellers with Thai destinations.

Most visitors **head** first **to**¹⁶ the southern beaches, especially Phuket and Krabi, **although**¹⁷ tourism authorities report growing interest in adding cultural stops such as Bangkok and northern Thailand to longer **itineraries**¹⁸.

INFOBOX

Geography & Climate

Thailand **covers**²⁷ more than five hundred thousand square kilometres and occupies a strategic position in mainland Southeast Asia. The country **borders**²⁸

Myanmar, Laos, Cambodia, and Malaysia, while long coastlines along the Gulf of Thailand and the Andaman Sea connect it to major **maritime trade routes**²⁹ linking Asia with Europe and the Middle East.

The tropical climate shapes both travel

patterns and economic activity. The cool season between November and February attracts the highest numbers of international visitors, as temperatures remain relatively moderate. The hot season that follows can bring temperatures above forty degrees Celsius in northern provinces such as Lampang and Mae Hong Son. From May **onwards**³⁰ the monsoon season brings heavy rainfall in parts of the south, although tourism continues throughout the year across different regions of the country.

Landscapes Beyond the Capital

Outside Bangkok, Thailand's geography becomes more diverse. In the north, the historic city of Chiang Mai sits among forested mountains and temples that date back to the Lanna Kingdom (13th–18th centuries). The region is known for craft traditions such as **silk weaving**³¹, **wood carving**³², and **silverwork**³³. Festivals such as Yi Peng, when thousands of lanterns are **released**³⁴ into the night sky, attract visitors from around the world.

Further south, coastal regions form the core of Thailand's international tourism image. Islands such as Phuket, Koh Samui, and Koh Phi Phi offer coral reefs, **limestone**³⁵ cliffs, and white-sand beaches. Marine parks in the Andaman Sea support diving and snorkelling tourism, while inland national parks such as Khao Sok combine rainforest trekking with lake-based eco-tourism.

Food Culture & Everyday Life

Cuisine³⁶ plays a major role in the country's global reputation. Thai cooking balances sweet, sour, salty, and spicy flavours through dishes such as tom yum soup, green curry, and pad thai (see Infobox). Street food remains an everyday part of urban life, with small vendors serving **noodles**³⁷, grilled meats, and fresh fruit from roadside kitchens throughout the country, throughout the day.

For many visitors, the accessibility of food culture becomes a defining part of the travel experience. Restaurants **range from** informal markets **to**³⁸ internationally recognised **fine-dining**³⁹ **establishments**⁴⁰. This

Culture and Social Customs

Social relationships in Thailand place strong **emphasis on**⁴³ politeness and respect.

The traditional **greeting**⁴⁴ is the wai, a gesture in which the hands are placed together with a small **bow**⁴⁵. Foreign visitors are not expected to perform the gesture perfectly, but showing **awareness of**⁴⁶ the

custom is usually **appreciated**⁴⁷ in both social and professional contexts.

These traditions form part of the broader cultural environment that supports Thailand's visitor economy. The country receives more than thirty mln international travellers annually, making tourism one of its most visible global industries. Yet tourism is only one part of Thailand's national story. Behind the temples, beaches and markets lies a complex economy that is **evolving**⁴⁸ rapidly as the country moves

toward higher-value industries and new technological sectors.

Three Thai Dishes Visitors Quickly Discover

Many travellers' first introduction to Thai cuisine comes through three widely recognised dishes that combine strong aromatics with balanced flavours.

Tom Yum – particularly the **prawn**¹ version Tom Yum Kung – is a hot-and-sour soup built around prawns **simmered with**² lemongrass, **galangal**³, **kaffir lime leaves**⁴ and **shallots**⁵. The result is a **layered**⁶ flavour profile that blends sour, **savoury**⁷, spicy and sometimes sweet notes. Restaurants usually serve **either** a clear broth (nam sai) **or**⁸ a richer creamy version (nam khon), often thickened with **evaporated milk**⁹ and roasted chilli paste rather than coconut milk.

Green curry (gaeng keow wan) takes a softer, coconut-based approach. Its colour comes from green chillies in the curry paste, which is typically blended with lemongrass, galangal, **makrut lime zest**¹⁰ and **shrimp paste**¹¹. The curry is then simmered in coconut milk and finished with **fragrant**¹² **herbs**¹³ such as Thai basil and makrut lime leaves.

Pad Thai offers a different experience altogether: **stir-fried**¹⁴ rice noodles coated in a sauce usually built from fish sauce, **tamarind**¹⁵ and palm sugar. Vendors commonly cook the noodles with **garlic**¹⁶, tofu, dried shrimp, **preserved**¹⁷ **radish**¹⁸ and egg before finishing the dish with crushed peanuts, lime and optional chilli condiments at the table.

Business in Thailand: From Volume to Value

Over the past three decades Thailand has developed one of Southeast Asia's most successful export economies. **Automotive manufacturing**¹, **electronics assembly**², and tourism helped transform the country into one of the largest economies in the ASEAN region. National **GDP**³ now stands at **roughly**⁴ USD 526 bln, according to the World Bank.

However, the global manufacturing landscape is changing. **Lower-cost**⁵ economies such as Vietnam and Indonesia are **attracting**⁶ **increasing**⁷ levels of industrial investment. Thailand therefore **faces pressure** to **upgrade**⁸ its production base and **compete**¹⁰ in higher-value sectors.

The government's main strategy for this transition is the Eastern Economic Corridor, covering the provinces of Rayong, Chonburi, and Chachoengsao along Thailand's eastern seaboard. The zone **includes**¹¹ more than thirteen thousand square kilometres, which **is set to**¹²

include **industrial estates**¹³, **logistics facilities**¹⁴, ports, and infrastructure projects designed to attract advanced industries.

Major global manufacturers already operate in the region. **Automotive plants**¹⁵

run by Toyota, Honda and Ford produce vehicles for both domestic markets and export. Electronics companies such as Western Digital and Seagate manufacture components used in **global data-storage systems**¹⁶.

Increasingly¹⁷, new investment is **focused on**¹⁸ advanced technologies. Electric vehicle production, battery manufacturing, robotics equipment, and biotechnology are among the industries targeted for development in the corridor. **Government incentives**¹⁹ support these investments through **tax exemptions**²⁰ of up to eight years, reduced **import duties**²¹ for industrial machinery, and **simplified**²² licensing

procedures managed by the Board of Investment.

Manufacturing Reinvented

Manufacturing remains one of Thailand's most important economic sectors. The industry **accounts for**²³ roughly twenty-five percent of national GDP and **employs**²⁴ more than six mln workers. Automotive production and wider sector

Long-Term Resident (LTR) Visa

Thailand introduced the Long-Term Resident Visa to attract international professionals and investors. The programme allows approved applicants to live in Thailand for up to ten years.

Eligible groups include:

- highly skilled professionals
- digital entrepreneurs
- wealthy **retirees**¹
- investors in Thai industries

Benefits include simplified work permits and favourable tax arrangements for foreign income.

industries **contribute**²⁵ about four to five percent of economic output, with around 1.5 mln vehicles produced **annually**²⁶.

Yet the industry is now entering a period of technological transformation. Electric vehicles are **reshaping**²⁷ **global automotive supply chains**²⁸. Chinese manufacturers such as BYD and Great Wall Motor have **announced**²⁹ large greenfield investments in Thailand, supported by **government subsidies**³⁰ that can reach **THB**³¹ 150,000 per vehicle. Thailand is also a major global producer of **air-conditioning technology**³², **reflecting**³³ a powerful domestic expertise in cooling systems designed for tropical climates.

Technology and Digital Infrastructure

Bangkok's technology sector is **expanding**³⁴ alongside traditional manufacturing industries. Startup companies, **venture capital firms**³⁵, and research centres

are increasingly concentrated in districts around Sukhumvit and the central business area. Technology parks and incubators support new companies developing digital services, financial technology platforms, and software applications.

Digital infrastructure supports this growth. Nationwide **5G coverage**³⁶ and **widespread**³⁷ mobile banking systems **allow**³⁸ businesses to operate efficiently across both urban and regional markets. These developments contribute to Thailand's ambition to position itself as a regional **technology hub**³⁹.

Demographics and the Remote Economy⁴⁰

Thailand's demographic profile is changing rapidly. The median age of the

population is now approximately forty-one years, significantly higher than neighbouring economies such as Vietnam or Cambodia. An **ageing**⁴¹ **workforce**⁴² may slow labour-force expansion, but it also **encourages**⁴³ greater investment in automation and **higher-skilled industries**⁴⁴.

Urbanisation is also **accelerating**⁴⁵. The Bangkok metropolitan region now contains around eighteen mln residents, making it one of Southeast Asia's largest urban areas.

At the same time, Thailand is **attempting to**⁴⁶ attract international professionals through new **visa policies**⁴⁷. The Long-Term Resident Visa programme allows qualified foreign residents to live in the country for up to ten years while receiving simplified **work permits**⁴⁸ and **favourable**⁴⁹ tax conditions. The policy aims to attract **entrepreneurs**⁵⁰, remote workers, and highly skilled professionals.

Investment Challenges

Despite⁵¹ strong industrial capabilities, Thailand still **faces**⁵² several structural **obstacles**⁵³.

Regulatory procedures can be slow, particularly when foreign investors attempt to **establish**⁵⁴ new companies. Recent rules introduced by the Department of Business Development **require**⁵⁵ Thai **shareholders**⁵⁶ associated with **foreign-linked**⁵⁷ firms to provide financial records proving **genuine**⁵⁸ **capital ownership**⁵⁹. The regulations aim to eliminate **nominee**⁶⁰ ownership structures but can **extend**⁶¹ company registration timelines from roughly one week to several weeks.

Infrastructure expansion has also experienced **delays**⁶² in some sectors as investors **adjust to**⁶³ economic conditions following the pandemic. As a result, **traffic congestion**⁶⁴ in Bangkok remains a **persistent**⁶⁵ challenge. **Average**⁶⁶ driving speeds in central districts often fall below twenty kilometres per hour during **peak hours**⁶⁷.

In Transition

Thailand in 2026 has a mature industrial economy attempting to move into a more advanced stage of development. Tourism and manufacturing remain central to national **income**⁶⁸, but **policymakers**⁶⁹ are increasingly focused on expanding sectors such as electric vehicles, digital services, biotechnology, and robotics. The success of this transition will **depend on**⁷⁰ how effectively the country **manages**⁷¹ demographic change, regulatory reform, and continued infrastructure development.

Candy Valentino

Candy Valentino: Slow and Steady Wins the Race¹

From an early age, the odds were stacked against² Candy Valentino, but she has proved that a difficult start doesn't have to be a barrier to success.

Born in Pennsylvania in 1979, she grew up on a trailer park³ (See Fact Box), in an environment⁴ where money was scarce⁵ and financial instability was the norm. This meant that a university education was not a realistic option, even if she had wanted it. Either way, she had already set her mind on⁶ dragging herself out of⁷ poverty⁸ and building a sustainable income⁹.

Jam Today

Ms Valentino says she started her first business at the age of 19, on a small scale, learning the basics¹⁰ of business. Over the next two decades, she built, operated and sold a series of privately held¹¹, cash-generating businesses, primarily in services¹², and later in real estate¹³ and advisory work¹⁴.

This narrative, as presented by Candy, has rather more romance than qualified¹⁵ examples. We can be sure, however, that they were relatively low-key¹⁶ projects and that she rejected¹⁷ the venture capital¹⁸ growth model¹⁹ that prevails²⁰ in modern business funding. Instead, she prioritised businesses capable of generating reliable cash flow²¹ early, enabling her to remain independent of external investors²². This reduced risk, preserved²³ control and created a stable base for long-term wealth accumulation²⁴. Looking psychologically, it

Trailer Park

In the United States, a trailer park is a **residential community**¹ of **mobile homes**², or **manufactured housing**³ placed on **rented**⁴ **lots**⁵ within a designated area. Originally used for **leisure**⁶, as car ownership boomed, mobile homes sited on housing-oriented parks expanded after World War II to meet the need for **affordable**⁷ housing. Although as many as 20 million people live in them nationally, the term 'trailer park' has become synonymous with poverty and low **social status**⁸.

may be a **legacy**²⁵ of a **childhood**²⁶ in which money in the pot today was more important than the promise of jam tomorrow²⁷ (see Fact Box).

Using capital from earlier exits, Valentino moved into private investing, concentrating on cash-generating businesses rather than **high-growth**²⁸ startups. Her **publicly stated**²⁹ focus is on **profitability**³⁰, operational discipline and **downside**³¹ protection – criteria shaped by having built companies without external funding. She has been **openly**³² critical of speculative **entrepreneurship**³³, arguing that **hype-driven**³⁴ models **expose**³⁵ inexperienced **founders**³⁶

to **unnecessary**³⁷ financial risk.

Her focus on the practical **placed her more in line with** operational business training **than**³⁸ **high-octane**³⁹ wealth seminars. Consequently, she moved towards business education and advisory services, **particularly**⁴⁰ for early-stage founders. Rather than promoting ambitious **growth forecasts**⁴¹ and hyping up company value to **cash in**⁴², Candy Valentino focuses on **applied finance**⁴³, **risk control**⁴⁴ and **repeatable**⁴⁵ **decision frameworks**⁴⁶. **Unfashionable**⁴⁷ as her **approach**⁴⁸ may have been, people started **paying attention**⁴⁹.

Wealth Habits⁵⁰

Wider recognition⁵¹ came with the publication of her first book, *Wealth Habits*, **released**⁵² in 2022. The book became a Wall Street Journal bestseller, reflecting strong **demand for**⁵³ a more **grounded**⁵⁴ approach to personal and business finance.

Wealth Habits presents wealth as a system: the interaction between income, **spending**⁵⁵, **saving**⁵⁶ and **investment**⁵⁷, rather than a **quest for**⁵⁸ a single **breakthrough moment**⁵⁹. **Drawing on**⁶⁰ her own journey from financial instability to **independence**⁶¹, she shows how disciplined structures can **outperform**⁶² high income when those structures are **absent**⁶³. A central theme of the book is that many **financial failures**⁶⁴ are **behavioural**⁶⁵ rather than economic, and that **resilience**⁶⁶ is built through **deliberate**⁶⁷ habits, not **earnings**⁶⁸ alone.

Key ideas and advice from the book include:

- “Wealth is built in the margins⁶⁹ of everyday decisions, not in rare⁷⁰ financial wins.”
- Prioritising savings and investment as non-negotiable⁷¹, fixed⁷² outgoings⁷³ rather than optional leftovers⁷⁴.
- Designing spending systems that limit decision-making and reduce reliance on⁷⁵ willpower⁷⁶.
- Separating lifestyle growth from income growth to prevent silent erosion⁷⁷ of wealth.
- Viewing financial independence as a process of risk reduction, not risk maximisation.

The book's clarity⁷⁸ and practical framing⁷⁹ helped establish⁸⁰ Ms Valentino as a serious voice in financial education, moving her into mainstream business thinking and an in-demand⁸¹ motivational speaker⁸².

Nine Percent

In 2025, she followed up with⁸³ *The 9% Edge*, in which she extends⁸⁴ her systems-based thinking from personal finance into performance⁸⁵ and leadership⁸⁶.

The book takes its title from the nine percent of startups that survive⁸⁷ past 10 years, using this statistic to illustrate that long-term success is rare, and that the difference lies in small, repeatable behaviours rather than talent or luck⁸⁸.

Candy Valentino emphasises⁸⁹ incremental⁹⁰ advantages that compound⁹¹ over time, showing how disciplined habits and strategic decisions separate the few who endure⁹² from the many who falter⁹³.

Key ideas and advice from the book include:

- “The 9% succeed because they do what others overlook⁹⁴ – every single day.”
- Focus on a narrow⁹⁵ strategic vision instead of chasing constant expansion.
- Treat energy, attention and focus as finite resources⁹⁶ to be managed deliberately⁹⁷.
- Build decision-making systems that reduce reactive⁹⁸ behaviour and errors.

- Measure⁹⁹ progress over long horizons to allow small advantages to compound.

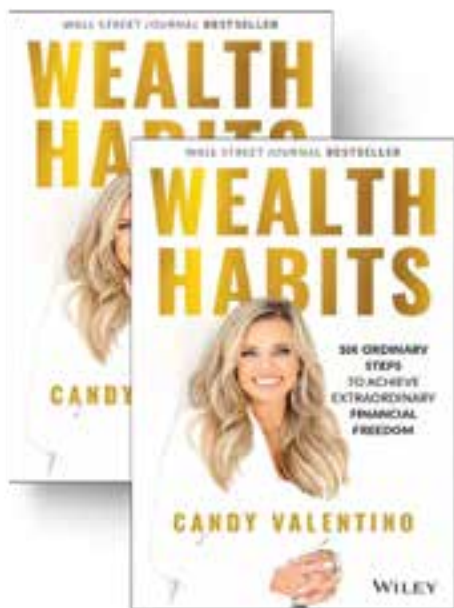
She shows that survival and growth are consequences of deliberate, repeatable choices rather than dramatic breakthroughs or exceptional¹⁰⁰ talent. That goes against the grain¹⁰¹ of the current zeitgeist¹⁰², in which many companies see the employment market¹⁰³ as a battlefield¹⁰⁴ to attract¹⁰⁵ ‘top talent,’ and have star players¹⁰⁶ score spectacular goals. Ms Valentino's approach is more akin to¹⁰⁷ building a solid defence.

Wider Reach

Alongside¹⁰⁸ writing, Valentino remains active as a speaker and educator. She regularly addresses¹⁰⁹ business audiences¹¹⁰ on entrepreneurship, wealth-building and leadership, with a particular emphasis on financial behaviour. One recurring theme¹¹¹ in her work is the psychological impact of growing up¹¹² without money, and how early experiences can influence¹¹³ risk tolerance, spending habits and decision-making later in life.

Philanthropy¹¹⁴ forms a structured¹¹⁵ part of Valentino's activities. Rather than donating¹¹⁶ money, she supports initiatives by providing financial education and entrepreneurial skills¹¹⁷. Her approach reflects her broader philosophy: addressing root causes¹¹⁸ rather than symptoms. Having

grown up without **exposure to**¹¹⁹ **financial literacy**¹²⁰, she places particular value on programmes that provide practical **tools**¹²¹ rather than **temporary relief**¹²².

Valentino's influence lies less in **personal branding**¹²³ and more in method. She does not present herself as an **outlier**¹²⁴, or a **one-off**¹²⁵ success, but as **proof**¹²⁶ that wealth can be built incrementally, by anybody, even without formal education or **early advantage**¹²⁷. This positioning has resonated with audiences who find conventional business success stories unrealistic or **inaccessible**¹²⁸.

In a business environment often dominated by narratives of **rapid scaling**¹²⁹ and **disruptive innovation**¹³⁰, Candy Valentino represents a different model: one built on repeatable systems, measured risk and long-term thinking. Her career demonstrates how financial independence can be achieved without **shortcuts**¹³¹, and how discipline, rather than spectacle, remains the most reliable **driver**¹³² of sustainable success. In many ways, that is a **reassuring**¹³³ message because it means that we don't have to be rich, lucky or a genius to succeed, just disciplined. Her approach may be closer to the **plodding**¹³⁴ **tortoise**¹³⁵ than the **flashy**¹³⁶, **over-confident**¹³⁷ **hare**¹³⁸, but we all know who won the race in the end.

Modern tourism has its **roots**⁶ in the 19th century, when travel was largely the **preserve**⁷ of the **wealthy**⁸. Grand Tours of Europe, luxury **ocean liners**⁹ and early **cruises**¹⁰ catered to¹¹ elites with time, money and social status. This exclusivity began to erode in the mid-20th century.

Rising **incomes**¹², **paid holidays**¹³ and commercial aviation **triggered**¹⁴ a mass tourism boom in the 1960s and 1970s, with sun-and-sea **resorts**¹⁵ along Spain's Costas and the Mediterranean becoming symbols of **affordable**¹⁶ escape. **Package holidays**¹⁷ standardised travel, making it **predictable**¹⁸ and accessible, but often **crowded**¹⁹, to the **extent that**²⁰ in some places, tourists are no longer welcome.

By the late 20th and early 21st centuries, **seasoned**²¹ travellers began to look beyond **familiar**²² beaches, **driving demand for**²⁴ **long-haul**²⁵ and exotic destinations in Asia, Africa and Latin America, perhaps **boasting about**²⁶ how many air miles they had **accumulated**²⁷ or countries they had visited.

Today, tourism continues to evolve as travellers start to look not just for good weather or **one-upmanship**²⁸, but a meaningful experience.

Fasten your seatbelts²⁹ as we **take off**³⁰

for a quick **round-the-world tour**³¹ of the latest travel trends (Popular Destinations by Holiday Type).

1. The Rise of Experience-Centric Travel

The most **striking**³² theme for 2026 is the shift from **generic**³³ **sightseeing**³⁴ to experience-driven travel. Modern tourists are seeking trips that leave them changed, not just **rested**³⁵. According to recent **industry**³⁶ **surveys**³⁷, more than half of travellers **worldwide**³⁸ plan trips built around hobbies and passions, from art and cycling to food and history.

One of the year's **headline**³⁹ trends is the "skillcation" – holidays built around learning a new **skill**⁴⁰. Instead of returning home with just **souvenirs**⁴¹ and **suntan**⁴², people are looking to practise activities such as **gourmet cooking**⁴³, traditional **crafts**⁴⁴,

foraging for⁴⁵ wild herbs⁴⁶ and even falconry⁴⁷. Hotels, resorts and retreats⁴⁸ are partnering with local experts to offer complete immersive⁴⁹ packages.

2. Set-jetting⁵⁰

So-called⁵¹ 'set-jetting' holidays are in vogue⁵², in which people visit places featured⁵³ in books, films or television shows. Examples are tours built around locations used in Downton Abbey, various Jane Austin novels, and further afield⁵⁴ in New Zealand, for The Lord of the Rings and The Hobbit fans, the Hobbiton Set Tour.

3. Slow Travel and Immersive Travel

In 2026, slower is better. Travellers are rejecting⁵⁵ packed⁵⁶ itineraries⁵⁷ that cram in⁵⁸ as many landmarks⁵⁹ as possible in favour of⁶⁰ deep engagement with local culture and environment⁶¹.

Road trips, camping and self-driven adventures fit this mindset⁶² perfectly. They blend freedom with discovery, enabling exploration⁶³ at one's own pace⁶⁴, connecting with nature and locals. This type of experience remains particularly appealing⁶⁵ in America and Canada, where long highways, cheap fuel and numerous⁶⁶ national parks offer endless⁶⁷ variety⁶⁸. Parts of Northern Europe also fit the bill⁶⁹.

Another trend tied to slow travel is the working farm holiday⁷⁰, or farm charm experience⁷¹. Travellers are increasingly attracted to rural stays⁷² where they can engage with⁷³ cultivation⁷⁴, animal care⁷⁵, gardening and countryside living, often alongside⁷⁶ local families.

This style blends education, authenticity and sustainability⁷⁷, drawing especially younger travellers who want experiential tourism⁷⁸ with roots in community⁷⁹ and place.

4. Wellness⁸⁰, Regeneration and Detox

We are used to the idea of a holiday being a chance to ‘recharge your batteries⁸¹,’ but now that reboot⁸² has extended to⁸³ physical, emotional and spiritual restoration⁸⁴. Here is how it is being manifested⁸⁵:

• Quietcations and Silent Retreats

The demand for peace and digital detox is growing rapidly. Concepts like quietcations and silent retreats, holidays designed around stillness⁸⁶, mindfulness⁸⁷ and immersive nature experiences are becoming mainstream responses⁸⁸ to digital burnout⁸⁹.

Whether in a forest cabin⁹⁰ or a mountainside lodge⁹¹, these trips prioritise mental clarity⁹² and emotional replenishment⁹³ over traditional sightseeing. They reflect a broader cultural shift⁹⁴: travel as wellness, not just relaxation.

• Glowcations

Emerging⁹⁵ strongly in 2026 are glowcations – trips designed around health, beauty and wellness. These combine spa treatments⁹⁶, specialised skincare⁹⁷ programmes, sleep therapies and personalised health plans. We can add to this yoga retreats, mindfulness workshops⁹⁸, forest bathing, and even “sound therapy” holidays.

community-led tourism initiatives. Places that **champion**¹⁰³ local culture and protect **fragile**¹⁰⁴ ecosystems are experiencing strong growth.

This trend includes:

- Low-impact itineraries: fewer flights, more train journeys and local transport.
- Regenerative tourism: activities that leave destinations better than before.
- Community **empowerment**¹⁰⁵: staying in locally owned lodges, **hiring**¹⁰⁶ local **guides**¹⁰⁷, and eating local food.

The goal is to travel with a positive social and environmental impact, **in short**¹⁰⁸, leaving somewhere in a better state than when you arrived. This is **in stark contrast to**¹⁰⁹ past decades of **overtourism**¹¹⁰, that has changed many places **beyond recognition**¹¹¹ and put home prices **beyond the reach**¹¹² of locals.

AI¹¹³ and Bespoke¹¹⁴ Planning

Really? Is AI involved in planning our holidays too? Artificial intelligence has **matured into**¹¹⁵ becoming a **critical**¹¹⁶ travel **tool**¹¹⁷. AI can **crunch**¹¹⁸ weather data, local events, culinary **hotspots**¹¹⁹ and cultural calendars to produce deeply **customised**¹²⁰ itineraries. The traditional **travel agent's**¹²¹ job may **be in peril**¹²². Many of us now book our own flights and **accommodation**¹²³. It may not be long before we **rely solely**¹²⁴ **on**¹²⁵ AI to design a personalised holiday using the criteria we have given it.

Personalisation and Meaning Above All

Travel trends for 2026 have moved a long way from mass tourism, **one-size-fits-all**¹²⁶ package holidays – although they will always have a place in the travel mix. Increasingly, today's travellers are prioritising depth, meaning and individuality. It **constitutes**¹²⁷ a fundamental **rethink**¹²⁸ of the bucket list concept in which, **fridge magnet**¹²⁹ purchased and selfie **snapped**¹³⁰, you can **cross it off**¹³¹ the list and **swiftly**¹³²

Ruby Wax: The Mindful¹ Comedian

Ruby Wax's **brash**² American comic **persona**³ is well-known to British **audiences**⁴, but behind the **façade**⁵ lies a deep, mindful and **multifaceted**⁶ person who, **in recent years**⁷, has **passed on**⁸ her **accumulated wisdom**⁹.

She was born Ruby Wachs on 19 April 1953 in Evanston, Illinois, a **suburb**¹⁰ of Chicago. Her parents, Austrian Jews who **fled**¹¹ Vienna in 1938 to escape the Nazis, **settled**¹² in the US, where her father became a **sausage**¹³ **manufacturer**¹⁴ and her mother an **accountant**¹⁵. She **attended**¹⁶ Evanston Township High School and later studied psychology at the University of California, Berkeley, though she left after a year without **completing** her **degree**¹⁷.

From Shakespeare to Stand-Up

Drawn to **performance**¹⁸ rather than **academia**¹⁹, she moved to the United Kingdom in the 1970s, **enrolling at**²⁰ the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama in Glasgow to **pursue acting**²¹.

The young Ms Wax began her career on the stage. After **graduating**²², she worked

as a **straight**²³ theatre actress at **venues**²⁴ such as the Crucible Theatre in Sheffield. She then joined the Royal Shakespeare Company in 1978, appearing in classic theatre productions such as *Measure for Measure* and *Love's Labour's Lost*.

in her 1994 interview with Madonna, the prima donna remained serious and defensive **throughout**⁶⁸. A **stunt**⁶⁹ by Wax of putting Madonna's **underwear**⁷⁰ on her head failed to **lighten the mood**⁷¹. The atmosphere became so **awkward**⁷² that Wax later described it as a "car crash⁷³" of an interview.

Undeterred⁷⁴, in 2000, she conducted a **one-off**⁷⁵ interview with Donald Trump. Given her previous **track record**⁷⁶ of **cringe-worthy**⁷⁷ moments, the interview with the future president **reached new heights**⁷⁸ of **awkwardness**⁷⁹ as his **demeanour**⁸⁰ moved from **bafflement**⁸¹ to **irritation**⁸². Things **took a nosedive**⁸³ when he said he wanted to become president, and she laughed, thinking he was joking. Seeing his **ire**⁸⁴ at her irreverent questioning, she said, "Do you hate me?" He replied, "No, I think you're fine, but that's enough."

Nonetheless⁸⁵, her **willingness**⁸⁶ to confront fame and celebrity with humour and naïve curiosity made her a **mischievous**⁸⁷ icon of British TV.

She also contributed **behind the scenes**⁸⁸ in television, working as **script editor**⁸⁹ on the hugely successful BBC sitcom *Absolutely Fabulous*, **hooking up** once more **with**⁹⁰ Jennifer Saunders, from 1992 to 2012. She was responsible for much of the comedy's sharp, **satirical edge**⁹¹ and brutal **one-liners**⁹² and **putdowns**⁹³, while also making occasional **on-screen appearances**⁹⁴.

At the peak of her powers⁹⁵, and an established figure⁹⁶ both in front of and behind the camera⁹⁷, you might **assume**⁹⁸ she would have **capitalised on**⁹⁹ her success by **devising**¹⁰⁰ a new series and **naming**

her price¹⁰¹. However, as her **interviewees**¹⁰² found, she has a way of **blindsiding**¹⁰³ people.

Mindfulness¹⁰⁴ and Mental Health¹⁰⁵: A Transformative Turning Point¹⁰⁶

Despite public success, Wax's personal life was marked by years of **bipolar disorder**¹⁰⁷ and depression, **struggles**¹⁰⁸ she initially **kept private**¹⁰⁹. But in the late 2000s and early 2010s, she began transforming that pain into performance and **advocacy**¹¹⁰. Her 2010 stand-up show, *Losing It*,

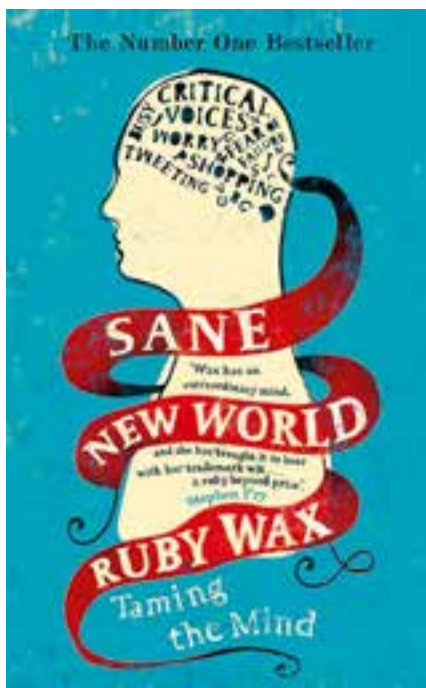

candidly¹¹¹ tackled¹¹² her mental health, including the time she had spent in a psychiatric clinic. This paved the way for¹¹³ a more profound shift¹¹⁴ in her career.

In 2013, she drilled down deeply into¹¹⁵ psychology by earning a Master's degree¹¹⁶ in Mindfulness-Based Cognitive Therapy from the University of Oxford. This wasn't just about getting a qualification or finally putting her academic demons to bed¹¹⁷; it signalled a significant¹¹⁸ change of direction and emphasis as a mental health educator and campaigner.

In 2013, she released¹¹⁹ the book *Sane New World: Taming the Mind*, which became a Sunday Times number-one best-seller, blending personal narrative with insights¹²⁰ into the mind. In it, she:

- explores why the modern mind is overwhelmed¹²¹, arguing that anxiety¹²² and stress are often the by-products¹²³ of how the brain evolved rather than personal weakness¹²⁴.
- uses her own experiences with depression to demystify¹²⁵ how thoughts spiral¹²⁶ and why we mistake them for reality.
- positions mental health as a skill to be learned, not a condition¹²⁷ to be hidden¹²⁸.

Ruby followed up the success of *Sane*

New World with two subsequent¹²⁹ titles: *A Mindfulness Guide for the Frazzled* (2016)

- Focuses on everyday stress rather than clinical illness¹³⁰, aimed at people who feel constantly overloaded¹³¹ but functional.
- Breaks mindfulness down¹³² into manageable¹³³, realistic practices that fit around¹³⁴ work and family life.
- Challenges common myths about meditation, presenting it as a mental habit¹³⁵ rather than a spiritual lifestyle¹³⁶.
- Encourages readers to notice¹³⁷ their mental autopilot and interrupt¹³⁸ it before burnout¹³⁹ sets in¹⁴⁰.

How to Be Human: The Manual (2018)

- Broadens the discussion¹⁴¹ beyond stress to examine how humans think, feel, connect and self-sabotage¹⁴².
- Combines humour with neuroscience and philosophy to explain why our brains often work against us.
- Looks at themes such as compassion¹⁴³, addiction¹⁴⁴, relationships and identity¹⁴⁵ through a mindful lens¹⁴⁶.
- Treats self-understanding¹⁴⁷ as a life-long practice rather than a quick fix¹⁴⁸.

While initially, it might seem that neuroscience¹⁴⁹ is something of a departure¹⁵⁰ from comedy, Ruby Wax embodies¹⁵¹ the adage¹⁵² that tragedy is just underdeveloped comedy¹⁵³. They often go hand in hand¹⁵⁴, and she reveals¹⁵⁵ and often pokes fun at¹⁵⁶ the challenges of being human. Ruby Wax has built on her own struggles

to help others to show more **self-compassion**¹⁵⁷ and learn how to become masters of their thoughts rather than **slaves**¹⁵⁸ to them. This is highlighted in some of her best-known **quotes**¹⁵⁹ on the subject:

*“Thoughts aren’t facts; they can only hurt you if you **buy into**¹⁶⁰ them.”*

*“This **disease**¹⁶¹ comes with a package: **shame**¹⁶². When any other part of your body gets sick, you get sympathy.”*

*“Life is not a **rerun**¹⁶³, we don’t have **stunt doubles**¹⁶⁴ or **understudies**¹⁶⁵... it actually matters what we do.”*

She was formally recognised in 2015, when she was **appointed**¹⁶⁶ **Honorary Officer of the Order of the British Empire**¹⁶⁷ (OBE) for her services to mental health, and she is a **visiting professor**¹⁶⁸ in Mental Health Nursing at the University of Surrey.

Continuing Influence at 73: Funny and **Wise**¹⁶⁹

Now in her early 70s, Ruby Wax remains as dynamic and energetic as ever. She appeared on the long-running Australian jungle-based reality show, *I’m a Celebrity... Get Me Out of Here!* in November–December 2025, lasting just over two weeks before being **voted out**¹⁷⁰ fifth (of 12). During her stay, she completed a **bush tucker**¹⁷¹ eat-ing **trial**¹⁷², consuming insects and **animal**

offal¹⁷³, while bringing her **inimitable**¹⁷⁴ humour to the camp. She has also been engaged in a **stage show**¹⁷⁵ and book, *I’m Not As Well As I Thought I Was*, that explores her **ongoing**¹⁷⁶ journey with mental health.

What **sets** Ruby Wax **apart**¹⁷⁷ is not just her sharp comedic timing but her willingness to **expose**¹⁷⁸ **vulnerability**¹⁷⁹ with humour. Whether with a studio audience or in a mindfulness seminar, her comedy remains as challenging and irreverent as ever, but with age, it is now **tempered with**¹⁸⁰ **wisdom**¹⁸¹ and compassion.

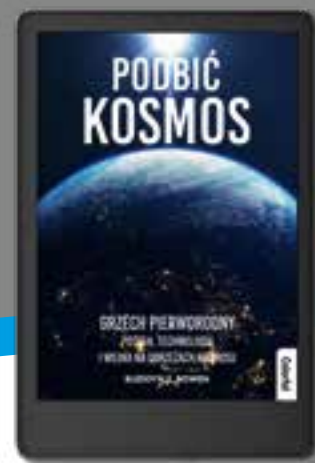

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The People Who Wear You Out¹

New **research**² suggests that your most stressful **relationships**³ may actually be taking years off your life. **Take a chill pill**⁴ with BEM's **Jonathan Sidor** to explore how **so-called**⁵ "**hasslers**⁶" affect your health – and what you can do about it.

We often hear that strong relationships are the key to a long and healthy life. Friends and **family members**⁷ who **have your back**⁸ can help you **manage**⁹ stress, build better interpersonal skills, and even live longer. But what happens when the opposite is true? Can our more **draining**¹⁰ relationships shorten our **lifespans**¹¹? **In a nutshell**¹² – yes.

The Hasslers Among Us

According to a **recent study**¹³ published in Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, some relationships may, in fact, speed up the aging process. These **pernicious**¹⁴ connections – **referred to as**¹⁵ hasslers – don't just **suck out**¹⁶ your energy. They might also be leaving a **measurable**¹⁷ **mark**¹⁸ on your body.

So, who exactly is a hassler? According to the research, hasslers are individuals in your **social circle**¹⁹ who regularly create stress **instead of**²⁰ reducing it. In many cases, these are family members who constantly **nag**²¹ you, friends who **stir up**²² **drama**²³, or **co-workers**²⁴ who do nothing but make your workday harder.

Researcher Byungkyu Lee made an **important distinction**²⁵: hasslers don't just create **occasional**²⁶ conflicts. They're people who repeatedly make life more difficult, constantly **making waves**²⁷, criticising, or **demanding**²⁸ help.

Interestingly enough²⁹, the study found

that nearly 30 percent of us already have at least one such person in our lives.

The Link³⁰ Between Stress and Ageing

We all have stress in our lives, and, **in most cases**³¹, it's no cause for **concern**³². Short-term stress can be beneficial, as it keeps us on our toes, motivating us to respond quickly and **solve problems**³³. Long-term stress, however – the kind **associated with**³⁴ hasslers – is a different story.

When stress becomes **chronic**³⁵, it can **trigger**³⁶ **inflammation**³⁷ in the body, a higher risk of **heart disease**³⁸, and a weaker **immune system**³⁹. This is exactly where things can get serious. Lee's study

analysed how social relationships affect **biological age**⁴⁰, or how the body appears at the **cellular level**⁴¹. And the results were **striking**⁴².

The research found that each **additional**⁴³ hassler in someone's life was linked to about 1.5 percent faster aging. This **roughly**⁴⁴ translates to adding nine extra months to your biological age. **In other words**⁴⁵, if you have three **troublesome**⁴⁶ people in your life, your body could be nearly two and a half years older than it should be.

Family Matters⁴⁷

Not all hasslers are **equal**⁴⁸. The study shows that stressful family relationships tend to have the strongest **impact on**⁴⁹ biological age. Why? The simplest reason is that they're harder to escape than other **social bonds**⁵⁰. If a friend or work colleague is **pestering**⁵¹ you, you can gradually distance yourself from them and **eventually**⁵² **get them off your back**⁵³. Achieving this is much more complicated with a parent, **sibling**⁵⁴ or child.

Family relationships are typically **deeply embedded in**⁵⁵ your life. You may spend the **majority**⁵⁶ of your life

around some of these **folks**⁵⁷, so eliminating them from your life often isn't realistic. **That said**⁵⁸, we usually have plenty to **gain**⁵⁹ from our family connections. Even if they come with moments that make you want to **rip your hair out**⁶⁰, they can still include moments of support and **genuine**⁶¹ **value**⁶², making them harder to **cut off**⁶³ completely.

Here's the twist⁶⁴ – there's one specific relationship that failed to produce a negative aging effect. The **surprising**⁶⁵ **exception**⁶⁶ is romantic relationships. A **stress-inducing**⁶⁷ **spouse**⁶⁸ or partner didn't show a link to accelerated ageing. Researchers believe this **boils down to**⁶⁹ the fact that such **unions**⁷⁰ frequently **include**⁷¹ a mix of **shared routines**⁷², emotional support, and financial or practical cooperation.

These positive aspects may balance out stress in ways that other relationships cannot. And it makes sense when you think about it. If you've bought a car, built a house, or raised a family with someone who happens to be **the love of your life**⁷³, it's easy to **recall**⁷⁴ your shared triumphs each time they happen to **get on your nerves**⁷⁵.

Why Hasslers Hurt⁷⁶ So Much

Peeling back the curtain⁷⁷ to investigate⁷⁸ the science behind stress and aging reveals fascinating results. **For instance**⁷⁹, the problem with hasslers isn't just that they **force** you to⁸⁰ experience **unpleasant situations**⁸¹. The real **threat**⁸² lies in the fact that dealing with them creates a constant state of **tension**⁸³ that your body and mind have to **cope with**⁸⁴.

Over time⁸⁵, this tension **essentially**⁸⁶ changes who you are. Instead of relaxing around a hassler, you start to expect conflict before it happens – even when nothing has **gone awry**⁸⁷. This **anticipation**⁸⁸ of the **worst-case scenario**⁸⁹ always **coming to fruition**⁹⁰ makes you feel **anxious**⁹¹ during interactions that should otherwise be normal and **calming**⁹². This pessimistic **outlook**⁹³ causes you to **brace for impact**⁹⁴ in all your conversations, so you're never really starting any interaction with a **clean slate**⁹⁵. Each hassler's baggage follows you around, and you're never really able to **rid yourself of it**⁹⁶.

In short, this **ongoing**⁹⁷ pressure from **handling**⁹⁸ hasslers leads to cumulative **wear and tear**⁹⁹ on the body that takes a **tangible**¹⁰⁰ **toll**¹⁰¹. It's not a single

argument¹⁰² or blow-up¹⁰³ that harms¹⁰⁴ you, but the years of small, repeated stress that you were never able to escape from.

Can You Do Anything About It?

The good news is that you aren't powerless¹⁰⁵ when it comes to hasslers. Of course, completely severing ties with¹⁰⁶ every difficult person in your life isn't exactly feasible¹⁰⁷. The real solution¹⁰⁸ lies in changing how you deal with them in everyday situations.

For instance, researchers¹⁰⁹ recommend setting boundaries¹¹⁰. Give yourself some respite¹¹¹ and limit how often you interact with stressful people. Moreover, restrict how deep these meetings¹¹² are. Instead of trapping oneself at¹¹³ an hours-long dinner for two, agree to sporadic¹¹⁴ group get-togethers¹¹⁵ where you have an easier out¹¹⁶.

Next, modify how you react to others' criticism and negative comments. You'll sadly never be able to control others, but you can determine your responses¹¹⁷ to them. Don't let any badgering¹¹⁸ get to you, and don't take critiques too seriously. If all else fails, step back¹¹⁹ and create some much-needed distance between you and problem individuals who've just become too much.

Other remedial¹²⁰ options centre on prioritising your health. Reduce your stress actively by exercising¹²¹, meditating and practicing deep breathing to protect your body from long-term damage. Furthermore, focus on the positive relationships in your life that actually support¹²² and energise you. Reinforcing¹²³ these fruitful¹²⁴ ties can help take your mind off¹²⁵ your hasslers and enable you to appreciate¹²⁶ the more precious¹²⁷ people around you.

Understanding Your Social Health

We usually think of health in terms of¹²⁸ diet and exercise, but this new research

highlights how vital your social environment¹²⁹ is to staying fit. Your relationships aren't just part of your life – they shape your physical well-being¹³⁰ in ways we're just beginning to comprehend¹³¹.

It's worth remembering that conflict is a normal part of life, and not every trying¹³² relationship needs to end. But when push comes to shove¹³³, chronic stress may come at a real cost.

Reflect on who wears you down¹³⁴ and who brings you joy, and you'll get a better grasp of¹³⁵ how long and how well you live.

Stephen Miller: Donald Trump's Architect of Obstruction¹

Stephen Miller is a **senior²** American **political advisor³** best known for **shaping⁴** **strict⁵** immigration policies⁶ under Donald Trump and beyond. Though rarely **in the spotlight until recently⁷**, his **influence⁸** runs deep⁹: he has helped turn a clear ideological agenda into law, raising fundamental questions about how far **political power¹⁰** can reach. **Paul Martin** explains who he is and why he **matters¹¹**.

Un-Californian Californian

Stephen Miller was born in 1985 in Santa Monica, a **coastal¹²** California city much more closely **associated¹³** with liberal-Democratic politics than with the kind of America First conservatism he is now known for.

And in the US context, where **political identity¹⁴** is often shaped as much by local culture as by family or education, it is **striking¹⁵** that Miller's **views¹⁶** did not **grow out of¹⁷** his **surroundings¹⁸** so much as place him in **sustained¹⁹** opposition to them.

The **pattern²⁰** was visible early. As a **secondary school²¹** student, he publicly criticised **bilingual²²** education programmes and what he saw as the **excessive²³** **accommodation²⁴** of **cultural difference²⁵**, writing letters to local **newspapers²⁶** and **appearing²⁷** on

radio programmes with a tone unusually **forthright²⁸** for his age.

Duke

Miller arrived at Duke University in 2003, moving from Santa Monica to an elite Southern institution he soon described as a “**battleground²⁹**” for the **American soul³⁰**. He **graduated³¹** in 2007 with a **degree³²** in **political science³³**, writing numerous **columns³⁴** for The Duke Chronicle. In them, he criticised immigration policies and multicultural ideas, arguing that Duke's support for **undocumented³⁵** students **undermined³⁶** respect for the law. These themes would remain central to his later career.

A major **turning point³⁷** came in 2006 with the Duke **lacrosse³⁸** **case³⁹**. Members of the university's lacrosse team were accused of **kidnapping⁴⁰** and **raping⁴¹** a black woman **hired⁴²** to perform as a stripper at a team party. The **allegation⁴³** **triggered⁴⁴** a national scandal, exposing **tensions⁴⁵** around

race, class, and **privilege**⁴⁶ and drawing intense media and campus reaction.

The case later **collapsed**⁴⁷. **Prosecutor**⁴⁸ Mike Nifong had **withheld**⁴⁹ key DNA evidence⁵⁰; all **charges were dropped**⁵¹, the players were declared **innocent**⁵², and Nifong was **disbarred**⁵³ and jailed for one day.

Miller took a clear position early. He argued that the accused players were being **sacrificed on the altar of**⁵⁴ **political correctness**⁵⁵, and **accused**⁵⁶ the university and media of acting on ideology rather than evidence, describing a “radical” academic culture that, in his view, had turned against its own – white – students.

The episode gave him his first **national platform**⁵⁷. He appeared on CNN and Fox News, using the case to argue that American institutions: universities, media and the legal system, could not be **trusted**⁵⁸ to act neutrally. What began as a campus scandal became, **in his framing**⁵⁹, **proof**⁶⁰ of a deeper conflict between “ordinary Americans” and an elite establishment. That **sharp**⁶¹, polarised framing would later define his work in Washington.

Architect of Obstruction

In practice, this has meant using political, legal and administrative **tools**⁶² not just to **advance**⁶³ policy, but to block, **delay**⁶⁴ and reshape the work of institutions themselves.

After graduating from Duke, Miller moved quickly into Washington politics. Within two years, he was working for Senator Jeff Sessions, a Republican from Alabama known for **hardline**⁶⁵ views on immigration, and soon became a key adviser shaping both **messaging**⁶⁶ and policy.

The **partnership**⁶⁷ shifted Sessions’ position in Washington. Miller helped turn him from a marginal figure into a central voice on immigration, writing **memos**⁶⁸ that framed it as a **direct**⁶⁹ economic **threat to**⁷⁰ American workers. At the same time, he built **links**⁷¹ with **right-wing**⁷² **online outlets**⁷³

such as Breitbart, helping **spread**⁷⁴ these ideas beyond the mainstream.

This **approach**⁷⁵ became visible during the 2013 immigration reform debate. A **bi-partisan**⁷⁶ group of senators proposed a **bill**⁷⁷ that included a **path**⁷⁸ to **citizenship**⁷⁹ for millions of undocumented migrants. Many expected it to pass, but Miller worked to stop it, **circulating**⁸⁰ arguments to journalists and activists that framed the bill as a threat to **national sovereignty**⁸¹.

When the bill later failed in the House of Representatives, much of the **resistance**⁸² was **linked to**⁸³ the wider campaign Miller had helped organise. By then, he had demonstrated how a small, **focused**⁸⁴ operation could **disrupt**⁸⁵, and obstruct, **agreement**⁸⁶ across both parties.

Trump I

When Donald Trump began his **presidential campaign**⁸⁷ in 2015, Miller was already well prepared for a political project built on disruption, and he joined the Trump campaign as a policy adviser and **speechwriter**⁸⁸, before moving into the White House as a senior adviser following Trump's **election**⁸⁹.

During that first term, he did not act as a traditional adviser, looking to build **consensus**⁹⁰; **instead**⁹¹, he operated as a driver of rapid, **unilateral**⁹² action. According to **officials**⁹³, his method involved **drafting**⁹⁴ **executive orders**⁹⁵ in secret to **bypass**⁹⁶ normal **review processes**⁹⁷, **ensuring**⁹⁸ policies moved before agencies or **courts**⁹⁹ could **respond**¹⁰⁰.

The **clearest example**¹⁰¹ was the 2017 Travel Ban against travellers from **specific**¹⁰² **Muslim-majority**¹⁰³ countries, which **grounded**¹⁰⁴ flights and caused chaos at international airports. Beyond the **immediate**¹⁰⁵ disruption, it tested the limits of the **administrative state**¹⁰⁶. He followed this with a "Zero Tolerance" immigration policy, which led to the **separation**¹⁰⁷ of children from their parents at the US's southern border. The forced **removals**¹⁰⁸ were hugely controversial; but for Miller, they were **assertions**¹⁰⁹ of national sovereignty.

Shadow State¹¹⁰

After Donald Trump's 2020 **election defeat**¹¹¹, Miller did not move into private business or lobbying, as many **former**¹¹² officials do. Instead, he **set up**¹¹³ a new organisation, America First Legal (AFL), presenting it as a conservative **counterpart**¹¹⁴ to the **long-established**¹¹⁵ American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), which defends **civil rights**¹¹⁶ in the courts. From outside the **government**¹¹⁷, Miller used AFL to **challenge**¹¹⁸ the policies of President Joe Biden's administration through a large number of **lawsuits**¹¹⁹.

These cases focused on **familiar**¹²⁰ topics: immigration, **diversity**¹²¹ programmes and government policy. **Supporters**¹²² saw this as an **ongoing**¹²³ defence of **constitutional limits**¹²⁴; critics saw an **effort**¹²⁵ to block reform through the courts. In any case, Miller was now using the **legal system**¹²⁶, outside of government, as a **tool of influence**¹²⁷.

Meanwhile, he was linked to conservative organisations operating within the orbit of Project 2025, a **wide-ranging**¹²⁸ effort led by the Heritage Foundation, a Conservative **think tank**¹²⁹, to prepare policy plans and personnel for a possible return to power. The project was designed **in part**¹³⁰ to **avoid**¹³¹ the **internal**¹³² resistance that had slowed parts of the first Trump administration. Critics described it as a "government-in-waiting"¹³³, intended to ensure **tighter**¹³⁴ ideological control from the **outset**¹³⁵.

Trump II

When Donald Trump returned to the White House in January 2025, that **network**¹³⁶ did not remain theoretical. It moved into government **alongside**¹³⁷ him, with Miller at its centre. Promoted to **Deputy Chief of Staff**¹³⁸ for Policy and **Homeland Security Advisor**¹³⁹, Miller's new (long) title **barely**¹⁴⁰ **captures**¹⁴¹ the scale of his influence. He is **widely considered**¹⁴² one of the most **consequential**¹⁴³ **unelected**¹⁴⁴ officials in **modern**¹⁴⁵ American history.

That influence now operates daily through what is known colloquially¹⁴⁶ as the “Stephen Miller call,” a 10:00 AM interagency¹⁴⁷ meeting where officials are pressed¹⁴⁸ on detailed¹⁴⁹ visa data. Critics describe this as turning the State Department into an “anti-immigration machine,” with visa delays reportedly rising as Miller pushes¹⁵⁰ for revocations¹⁵¹.

His approach extends beyond immigration. At the “Shield of the Americas” Summit¹⁵² in March 2026, he urged¹⁵³ Latin American military leaders to treat¹⁵⁴ drug cartels¹⁵⁵ as a wartime¹⁵⁶ threat, comparing¹⁵⁷ them to ISIS and warning against legal restraint¹⁵⁸. For critics, this signals a shift away from legal norms¹⁵⁹; for supporters, a long-awaited¹⁶⁰ hard response¹⁶¹ to organised crime¹⁶².

Broadly, at the centre of Stephen Miller’s agenda¹⁶³ is the affirmation¹⁶⁴ of unilateral presidential power. By advancing policies such as attempts to end birthright citizenship¹⁶⁵ through executive action, Miller is no longer simply shaping policy, but testing the limits of the American system itself. Whether this will result in a more “imperial presidency” in the long-term remains one of the defining questions of Trump’s second term – and of Stephen Miller’s legacy¹⁶⁶ within it.

Range of Criticism¹

A number of organisations, politicians and international bodies have strongly criticised Stephen Miller’s ideas and actions. Their concerns² focus mainly on immigration policy, civil rights, and the use of government power.

Southern Poverty Law Center (SPLC)

The Southern Poverty Law Center is a US organisation that monitors hate groups³ and extremism. In 2020, it described Miller as an “extremist.” This judgement⁴ was based on leaked emails in which he shared or promoted texts linked to white nationalist⁵ thinking, including a controversial novel called *The Camp of the Saints*. The group argues that some of his ideas are connected to beliefs about protecting certain populations over others, and to conspiracy theories⁶ about cultural or demographic “replacement⁷.”

ACLU and Civil Rights Groups

The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) is a major organisation that defends individual rights under the US Constitution. Together with more than 90 other groups, it has criticised Miller’s policies, especially his support for expanding⁸ government surveillance⁹ powers under a law known as FISA Section 702, which allows intelligence agencies¹⁰ to collect data without a standard warrant¹¹ in

some cases. Critics say this could be used to monitor¹² protesters or political opponents¹³. They have described his approach as showing an “authoritarian¹⁴” attitude toward¹⁵ power.

Senator Thom Tillis (Republican Party)

Criticism has not only come from political opponents. Thom Tillis, a senator from the same Republican party, publicly criticised Miller, calling him a “big problem” and an “amateur,” arguing that Miller’s strong influence over government departments had led to policy failures¹⁶ and damaged the reputation of the Republican Party.

United Nations and Human Rights Watch

International organisations have also raised concerns. The United Nations and Human Rights Watch, a global human rights organisation, criticised the “Zero Tolerance” immigration policy introduced during Trump’s first term. This policy led to the separation of many migrant children from their parents at the US border. These organisations argue that such actions may break international law¹⁷ and represent serious human rights¹⁸ violations. Later operations linked to stricter enforcement¹⁹ have also been described as examples of state-backed²⁰ violence²¹.

The Robot That Wants to Feel Human

Humanoid robots have long promised a future of machines living alongside people, but most still look and behave like industrial tools. **Paul Martin** finds out more about Moya, a new Chinese robot designed to look, move and even feel just as warm as a human companion.

Meet Moya

For decades, robots were built mainly for factories. Their job was simple: **assemble**¹ parts, **lift**² heavy objects and repeat tasks with precision. These machines were powerful and **efficient**³, but they were never meant to interact closely with people.

That is now beginning to change. Around the world, engineers are developing humanoid robots designed to operate in hospitals, hotels and public spaces. One of the most unusual examples is Moya, a humanoid platform developed by the Shanghai robotics startup DroidUp. **Unveiled**⁴ at a Shanghai Trade Show in January 2026, Moya is designed not just to **perform tasks**⁵ but to interact with people in a socially natural way.

The project is led by robotics researcher Li Qingdu, who founded DroidUp in 2021. Li argues that most robots appear cold and mechanical. While that design works in **industrial settings**⁶, it becomes a problem in environments where robots must interact directly with humans. His solution was to

create a robot that feels more **approachable**⁷. **Instead of**⁸ **focusing** only **on**⁹ strength or speed, Moya was designed around the idea of “**emotional proximity**¹⁰,” making people feel comfortable interacting with a machine.

Moya stands about 1.65 metres tall, roughly the height of an **average**¹¹ adult. The robot weighs only 32 kilograms, making it significantly lighter than many humanoid robots of similar size. Its lower weight also **improves**¹² safety. If a robot falls or **bumps into**¹³ someone, the **risk of injury**¹⁴ is reduced.

Walking the Walk

One of Moya’s most unusual features is its **outer**¹⁵ surface. Beneath the robot’s silicone skin are heating elements that maintain a temperature between 32°C and 36°C, roughly the warmth of human skin. The idea is simple: if the robot feels warm to the touch, interactions may feel more natural. Studies suggest people often associate physical warmth with trust and friendliness.

Not everyone is convinced. Some observers say that warm skin combined with

mechanical movement can feel slightly **unsettling**¹⁶, a classic example of the “**uncanny valley**”¹⁷ (See Infobox), where a robot appears almost human but not quite enough to be **fully convincing**¹⁸.

That **tension**¹⁹ becomes clearer once the robot begins to move. Walking on two legs remains one of the most difficult challenges in robotics. Moya is reported to use the latest generation of DroidUp’s **bipedal walking platform**²⁰, reportedly referred to as Walker 3. Instead of **relying entirely**²¹ on²² rigid **gear joints**²³, the robot is claimed to use a **tendon-driven**²⁴ system that mimics human muscles and tendons. Motors in the **torso**²⁵ pull cables that move the limbs, reducing weight in the legs and **allowing**²⁶ smoother motion. DroidUp says the robot now achieves around 92 percent human-like **gait accuracy**²⁷.

Movement alone, however, is not enough for social interaction. Moya’s face therefore

The Uncanny Valley Explained

The “uncanny valley” is a concept in robotics and psychology that describes the discomfort people sometimes feel when a machine looks almost human, but not quite. The term was first proposed in 1970 by Japanese roboticist Masahiro Mori. Mori suggested that as robots become more human-like, people’s emotional response to them becomes increasingly positive, but **only up to a point**¹. When realism becomes very close but still imperfect, that response suddenly drops into a “valley” of **unease**².

Small details can **trigger**³ this reaction: slightly unnatural facial expressions, mechanical movement, or skin that appears real but behaves differently from human skin. The result can feel deeply unsettling, even when the robot is technically impressive. Designers of social robots therefore **face**⁴ a difficult challenge. They must decide whether to make machines clearly robotic, **avoiding**⁵ the uncanny valley entirely, or to **push toward**⁶ greater realism and risk **crossing**⁷ it.

contains²⁸ over 25 small motors that control expressions such as smiling, nodding²⁹ and raising eyebrows. Cameras behind the robot's eyes track nearby faces, while its AI analyses speech, tone and posture to interpret human emotions. The aim is not to replicate³⁰ human feelings perfectly, but to make conversations feel more natural.

Next Phase

Early coverage³¹ suggests a reported starting price of around RMB 1.2 million (roughly PLN 615,000–650,000 depending on exchange rates³²), meaning the robot is unlikely to³³ be aimed at private homes. Instead, DroidUp plans to deploy³⁴ the first units in institutional settings where the technology can be tested and refined³⁵. One likely area is elder care, where robots could provide companionship and assist human caregivers³⁶ as populations age³⁷. Another potential role lies in public service environments such as airports, museums and luxury hotels, where humanoid robots could guide visitors, answer questions and help people navigate³⁸ large buildings.

Moya is entering a rapidly expanding³⁹ field. Companies such as Tesla and Boston Dynamics are developing their own humanoid machines, although many of these are focused exclusively on industrial work rather than social interaction. DroidUp's strategy is different. Moya is designed primarily for environments where communication and human presence matter⁴⁰ as much as mechanical capability.

That ambition also raises important questions⁴¹. Highly realistic robots can sometimes feel unsettling, and their cameras and sensors inevitably⁴² raise concerns about⁴³ privacy. There is also debate about whether machines should play a role in caregiving⁴⁴, an area traditionally built on human relationships.

Despite⁴⁵ these concerns, interest in humanoid robotics is growing rapidly. China is investing heavily in⁴⁶ the sector as companies compete to build

machines capable of operating in everyday environments.

DroidUp has indicated that⁴⁷ early deployments⁴⁸ may begin in institutional environments around late 2026. For now, the robot remains an experiment in how machines might interact with humans in the future. But the broader direction is becoming clear. Robots are beginning to move beyond factory floors and into public life – and machines like Moya suggest that the next generation of robots may need to do more than simply work. They may need to connect with people as well.

Business Dialogues: Red Zone¹

Aetheris Global Logistics built its Middle East operation² around Dubai, where more than two hundred international staff³ now live and work. But a sudden⁴ regional conflict and drone strikes⁵ near logistics corridors⁶ have pushed evacuation insurance premiums⁷ up by 400 percent while commercial flight options rapidly disappear⁸.

Security Director⁹ Elias Thorne wants immediate extraction¹⁰. Operations VP Sarah Chen fears abandoning¹¹ the hub¹² will destroy a decade of market-building, while Chief Legal Counsel¹³ Marcus Vane must ensure¹⁴ any decision protects staff without exposing¹⁵ the company to massive legal liability¹⁶.

ACT 1: The Disruption¹⁷

Location: Secure Video Call – 04:15

Elias: (Rubbing his eyes¹⁸) Look, I'll be blunt¹⁹. The window we talked about yesterday? It's gone.

I just got off with the **ground team**²⁰ at Dubai Airport, and the **civil aviation authority**²¹ is about twenty minutes away from **issuing**²² a full **grounding for**²³ anything that isn't military or diplomatic.

Sarah: Wait, what, twenty minutes? Elias, we still have forty people, mostly the **tech leads**²⁴ and their families, who haven't even finished packing their "**go-bags**²⁵." We were operating on the **assumption**²⁶ that we had until at least tomorrow morning.

Elias: The reality is that this assumption was based on yesterday's **intel**²⁷. **Things have shifted**²⁸. There's a drone corridor opening up to the north, and no commercial pilot is going to touch that **airspace**²⁹. If we don't **pull the trigger**³⁰ on the **private charters**³¹ in the next hour, we're looking at a **long-term shelter-in-place**³². And I'm not sure the **backup**³⁴ generators in the villa complex are up to a two-week **siege**³⁵.

Marcus: I'm **struggling with**³⁶ the private charter part of this, Elias. **From a compliance standpoint**³⁷, if we move staff onto **non-scheduled**³⁸ flights while the airspace is being **contested**³⁹, are we even **covered**⁴⁰? My **concern**⁴¹ is that we're jumping **from the frying pan into the fire**⁴². If something goes wrong on a **private bird**⁴³, our **Duty of Care**⁴⁴ liability is **off the charts**⁴⁵.

Elias: (Sighs⁴⁶) Marcus, I hear you, I really do. But the alternative is leaving two hundred people in a city where the **supply chains**⁴⁷ are about to **snap**⁴⁸. I'd rather defend a charter decision in **court**⁴⁹ than explain to a family why we left their parents in a **blackout zone**⁵⁰.

ACT 2: The Deep Dive⁵¹

One Hour Later

Sarah: Okay, the first bus is moving, but we've hit a **snag**⁵². **To be honest**⁵³, I'm getting a lot of **pushback**⁵⁴ from the local engineering team. They know that if they leave the servers running without a physical **handover to**⁵⁵ the local partners, the **state**⁵⁶ is going to classify it as abandonment. We're talking about three hundred million in **bonded**⁵⁷ **equipment**⁵⁸ – **assets**⁵⁹ that were imported **under a tax suspension**⁶⁰. If we walk away without **signing it over**⁶¹ or exporting it properly, **customs**⁶² can treat the whole lot as abandoned **cargo**⁶³ and **come after**⁶⁴ us for the **duties**⁶⁵ and **penalties**⁶⁶.

Marcus: Is there any **middle ground**⁶⁷? Could we potentially leave a "rotational **skeleton crew**⁶⁸," just **the bare minimum**⁶⁹ to **keep the lights on**⁷⁰ and the legal status active?

Elias: (Leaning forward) **Let's be frank**⁷¹, Marcus. A "skeleton crew" is just a **polite way**⁷² of saying "people we're willing to risk." I can't, **in good conscience**⁷³, **sign off on**⁷⁴ that. If the **power grid**⁷⁵ goes, and

it will, those servers are **paperweights**⁷⁶ anyway. Why are we even debating the **hardware**⁷⁷ when the literal roof is falling in?

Sarah: Because if we lose the licenses, we don't have a job to come back to. I'm not being cold; I'm trying to **see the forest for the trees**⁷⁸. If we do a "dark-site" **wipe**⁷⁹ and just **vanish**⁸⁰, our local partners will interpret that as a **breach**⁸¹. We'll be **tied up in**⁸² **litigation**⁸³ for a decade. Is there any way we can use the **security contractors**⁸⁴ to **stay behind**⁸⁵?

Marcus: That's a bit of a **grey area**⁸⁶. I'd need to see if their contract allows for **asset protection**⁸⁷, or if they're strictly personnel. It's a **significant lift**⁸⁸ on the legal side to **pivot**⁸⁹ that quickly.

Elias: It's also a massive "**danger pay**⁹⁰" premium. We're talking an extra **fifty-k**⁹¹ a day just to have them sit in the **lobby**⁹².

Sarah: Just send it. I'll look at it on the flight. For the time being, let's just focus on **getting** that third bus **inside the perimeter**¹²¹. Everything else is **secondary**¹²².

Elias: Once the **manifest**¹²³ is confirmed, I'll send a **ping**¹²⁴ to the **encrypted folder**¹²⁵. Marcus, keep the line open to the **embassy**¹²⁶. If that checkpoint **turns south**¹²⁷, I'm going to need you to start making calls at the ministerial level.

1: Navigating Conflict

- **A bit of a grey area:** Used when a situation is not clearly defined by rules or ethics.
- **I hear you, I really do:** Validates the other person's point before introducing a counter-argument.

2: Under Pressure

- **Duty of Care liability:** The legal risk associated with failing to protect employees.
- **Operating on the assumption:** Based on information that might be outdated or incorrect.
- **A rounding error:** Describing a cost that is insignificant compared to the total stakes.
- **See the forest for the trees:** Focusing on the big picture rather than small, immediate details.
- **Square the circle:** Finding a way to satisfy two seemingly impossible requirements.
- **Significant lift:** Describing a task that requires a lot of effort, money, or legal work.
- **Stop-gap:** A temporary, imperfect solution designed to last a short time.

3: Practical Next Steps

- **Circle back:** To return to a conversation or person later with more information.
- **For the time being:** Focusing on the immediate present rather than the long-term.
- **A nail-biter:** A situation that is very tense or uncertain.
- **Pull the trigger:** To finally make a big decision or start an action.
- **Reassess the fallout:** To look at the consequences of a decision after the crisis has passed.
- **In the red zone:** A state of high alert or the final, most dangerous phase of a project.
- **Top-down mandate:** An order that comes from leadership and is not up for negotiation.

4: Contingency & Emergency

- **Red zone:** The final and most dangerous phase of an operation, when time is nearly exhausted and conditions are rapidly deteriorating.
- **Bonded equipment:** Imported equipment held under a customs bond or tax suspension; if abandoned or improperly transferred, the company may become liable for duties, penalties, or seizure of the assets.
- **Go-bag:** A pre-packed emergency bag containing essentials needed for rapid evacuation, often used in security or disaster planning.
- **Shelter-in-place:** An emergency procedure where people remain inside a protected location rather than evacuating due to external danger.
- **Skeleton crew:** The smallest number of staff required to keep operations running temporarily during a crisis.
- **Grounding:** An aviation order preventing aircraft from taking off or landing in a specific airspace.
- **Extraction:** A coordinated evacuation operation designed to remove personnel from a dangerous environment.



Yevgeny Primakov

(1929–2015) was a Soviet and later Russian **statesman**¹ whose strategic thinking shaped Russia's post-Cold War **foreign policy**². As **foreign minister**³ and **prime minister**⁴, he **developed**⁵ the "Primakov Doctrine," **rejecting**⁶ US dominance in favour of a multipolar world of competing power centres. Primakov argued that creating instability between major powers – especially the United States, Europe, China and regional actors in the Middle East – could weaken Western unity. This **approach**⁷ supports indirect methods such as instigating **proxy conflicts**⁸, **disinformation campaigns**⁹, and applying indirect pressure on Europe's borders. Formulated after the USSR's **collapse**¹⁰, this **framework**¹¹ has endured and has later been **reinforced by**¹² thinkers such as Alexander Dugin, who has given it a more explicit ideological form.

Naval Ravikant

(b. 1974) is an Indian-American **entrepreneur**¹³, investor and thinker best known for **distilling**¹⁴ complex ideas about wealth, happiness, and decision-making into **strikingly**¹⁵ simple **principles**¹⁶. As **co-founder**¹⁷ of AngelList, he helped reshape startup investing, giving early-stage companies wider access to capital. Yet his wider **influence**¹⁸ lies in his writing and interviews, where he **blends**¹⁹ philosophy, economics and **personal development**²⁰. Ravikant argues that **modern**²¹ **suffering**²² is rarely caused by material lack, but by comparison and desire – "happiness is being satisfied with what you have; success comes from wanting what you have." In an age defined by constant measurement and competition, his ideas offer a **counterpoint**²³: that freedom comes not from **constant craving**²⁴, but from learning what *not* to want.

Ewa Woydytło

(b. 1939) is a Polish psychologist, therapist and author whose work has shaped public understanding of **addiction**²⁵, **emotional health**²⁶ and **personal responsibility**²⁷. Trained in clinical psychology and long **associated with**²⁸ the Institute of Psychiatry and Neurology in Warsaw, she became **widely known for**²⁹ her writing on alcoholism and **co-dependency**³⁰, particularly in post-communist Poland, where these problems were often **hidden**³¹ or **poorly understood**³². Woydytło combines psychological **knowledge**³³ with a clear, direct approach, emphasizing personal responsibility, **self-awareness**³⁴ and the effort needed to change. Through her books, lectures, and media work, she argues that **emotional maturity**³⁵ requires facing **uncomfortable truths**³⁶ about yourself, rather than relying on simple explanations or blaming others.

Being Gordon Ramsay

We are passing on the Melania film to review Netflix's documentary series, *Being Gordon Ramsay*. But are they both just self-promotion vehicles¹, with the latter involving more swearing? The series is anchored around² Gordon Ramsay's ambitious plan to open five distinct dining and hospitality concepts simultaneously inside 22 Bishopsgate, one of London's tallest buildings, with millions of pounds of investment and tight deadlines to meet. This is a little contrived³. However, as the episodes unfold, we eavesdrop⁴ on design and supplier negotiations, battles over tight schedules, menu planning, staffing and applying different restaurant business models. In many ways, it is a complete business management training course. The documentary also cuts between professional decision-making pinch points and family commitments⁵. Gordon Ramsay is not afraid to expose his moments of self-doubt⁶, but like any superhero worth his salt⁷, we know he will come out victorious in the end. The clue lies in the production company, revealing that this isn't an incidental fly-on-the-wall⁸ documentary. Studio Ramsay Global was launched as part of a strategic partnership between Ramsay and FOX Entertainment to develop and produce high-profile culinary and lifestyle programming for global audiences. That said, it is not a bad bill of fare⁹. You will have to decide for yourself – as they say, “the proof of the pudding is in the eating”¹⁰.

Unhinged¹ Habits – Jonathan Goodman

Unhinged Habits is a manifesto² for greater productivity through imbalance. Currently available only as an audio-book, Jonathan Goodman's book argues that many people are organised, disciplined and busy, yet stuck because they never deliberately³ break rhythm. We try too hard to keep all the balls in the air⁴, all the time.

At the centre of the book is Goodman's 8:4 Rule, in which he proposes dividing the year into roughly eight months of intense focus and four months of deliberate downshifting⁵. These “seasons” don't have to follow the calendar; they can align with⁶ work cycles, family needs or personal energy, but the idea is to alternate rocket science between periods of concentrated effort, and rest, exploration and reconnection. Pushing hard and stepping back are treated as equally intentional and valuable. Other frameworks⁷ build on this logic. The Explorer's Compass encourages small disruptions to routine to restore curiosity, while his model for evaluating friendships challenges listeners to distinguish⁸ between genuine⁹ connection and social inertia¹⁰ (Like!).

Some may argue that this is not rocket science, and that we all have periods of intensive work or study followed by times when we take our foot off the pedal¹¹. True as that may be, Goodman provides a wake-up call¹² to distribute our energy in strong bursts rather than operate at half-power throughout the year – effectively, just treading water¹³.

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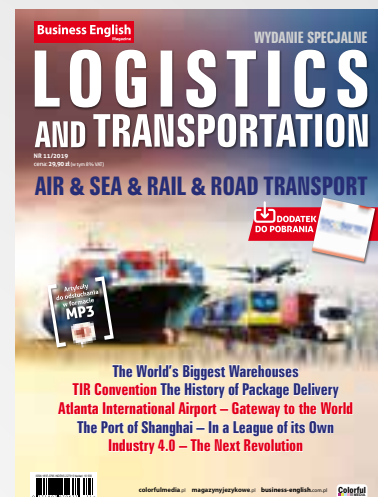
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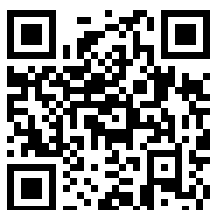
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
